



LETTER TO FREDERICK DOUGLASS, WITH

REPLY. BY HENRY C. WRIGHT.

BOSTON, JANUARY 22, 1845.

DEAR FREDERICK: This is the first letter of advice I ever wrote to you... I have given you the opinion I am glad to have done so.

As a nation, that condescends to profess to be based on the principle of liberty, and gave you an inalienable right to liberty, claim the right of property in your body and soul to turn your own property as you please.

I am in England, my family are in the United States... I have given you the opinion I am glad to have done so.

My wife and children are for the sale, and your power to grant them; but the greater will and more glorious will be the conflict; the more you give them, the more you give to the nation of man that claims you as a slave, or a man.
