As I am the mutual friend referred to in Dr. Lord's reply to Daniel Foster, I deem a few words from myself necessary in the premises.

In Dr. Lord's Philosophical Tract, No. 2, p. 6, he says—Now, I propose to give you a remedy for all these evils...

Again, p. 8:—I am no misanthrope, no infidel, no skeptic, but I owe it to God and Nature that I am not, and not to the world's wit or wisdom...

The following is a fundamental rule in the Doctor's principles of logic—Every hypothesis, assumption, or supposed fact, which presents itself as a candidate for a place in our creed...

Now, by this rule, I am willing to try the question, whether Moses and Jesus were ever antagonistic; and if I can show it in a single instance...
