An omnibus was provided, and about half past 11 o'clock the woman was placed therein, and accompanied by several of the Marshalls, taken over to Kentucky, to the house of her owner. At about the same time, the wounded slave was placed in an express wagon, and being properly guarded, was also taken to her master's residence.
