THE BUSINESS OF THE SOUTH.

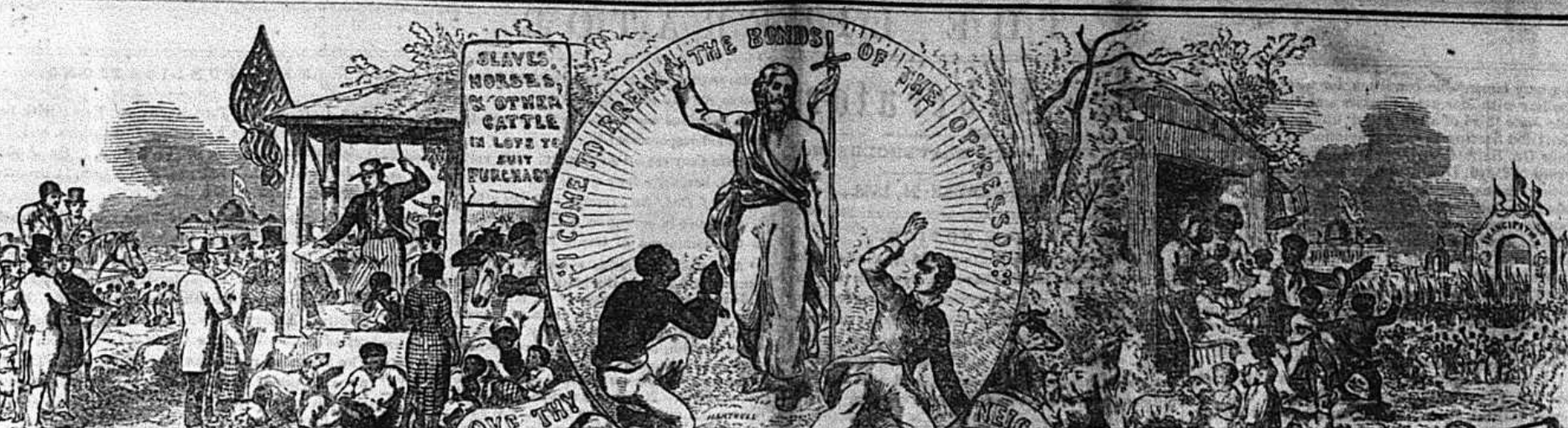
