RELATIONS OF SLAVERY TO THE U. S. CONSTITUTION. This fact proves, not only the intention and consequent guilt of the United States concerning slavery, but also that the Constitution which they adopted is indeed rightly designated as 'a covenant with death, and an agreement with hell, which ought not any longer to be upheld.
