Philadelphia, July 8th, 1833.

My DEAR FRIEND—I hasten to inform you, that the bark Hercules arrived in this place, from Liberia, on Saturday last...

The following is an extract of a letter from Gov. Mecllin, published in the African Repository for July.

It was my intention to have written very fully by this vessel, but my health has been so much impaired by repeated attacks of fever...

This season has been unusually unhealthful. We have, at one time, upwards of FORTY HUNDRED invalids on our list...

It is a great blessing, that at such a period, I have been enabled to remain here during the rainy season, so that I am convinced, he will sacrifice his life...

Idea St.—It was with some surprise that I observed in your paper of the 6th inst. a paragraph in Mr. Child's speech at the first anniversary of the New England Anti-Slavery Society...

(1) We confess our utter surprise that Mr. Ladd should make this assertion. Will he deny that he has ridiculed the Society, and accused it of attempting to 'drive the wedge between the friends'...
