The Declaration of Sentiments, published  
recently with contributions by those who had  
subscribed the Liberator, contains the following

free States, to remove slavery by just and  
constitutional means, as prescribed in the  
Constitution of the U. S."  
After mentioning the pledge of the free States to  
put down slavery, the Liberator, in its issue of  
the 15th inst., has published a circular, in which
