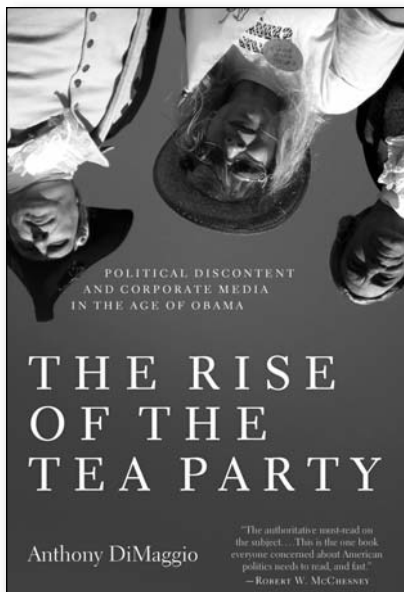

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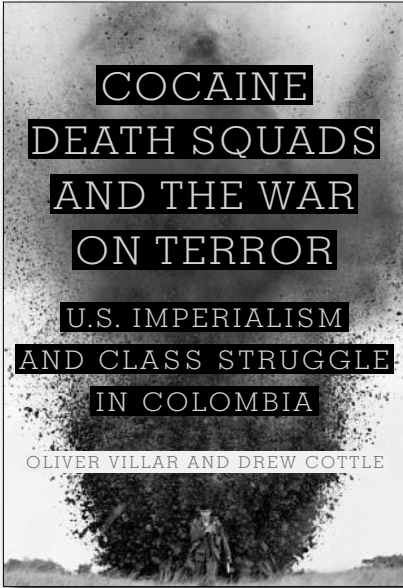

COCAINE, DEATH SQUADS, AND THE WAR ON TERROR

U.S. Imperialism and Class Struggle in Colombia

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OLIVER VILLAR is a lecturer in Politics at Charles Sturt University. He has published broadly on the inter-American cocaine drug trade, the U.S. war on drugs and terror in Colombia, and U.S.-Colombian relations.

DREW COTTLE is a senior lecturer in Politics at the University of Western Sydney. He has written widely on international political economy and revolutionary struggles in the Third World.

Since the late 1990s, the United States has funneled billions of dollars in aid to Colombia, ostensibly to combat the illicit drug trade and State Department-designated terrorist groups. The result has been a spiral of violence that continues to take lives and destabilize Colombian society. This book asks an obvious question: are the official reasons given for the wars on drugs and terror in Colombia plausible, or are there other, deeper factors at work?

Scholars Villar and Cottle suggest that the answers lie in a close examination of the cocaine trade, particularly its class dimensions. Their analysis reveals that this trade has fueled extensive economic growth and led to the development of a “narco-state” under the control of a “narco-bourgeoisie” which is not interested in eradicating cocaine but in gaining a monopoly over its production. The principal target of this effort is the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia (FARC), who challenge that monopoly as well as the very existence of the Colombian state. Meanwhile, U.S. business interests likewise gain from the cocaine trade and seek to maintain a dominant, imperialist relationship with their most important client state in Latin America. Suffering the brutal consequences, as always, are the peasants and workers of Colombia. This revelatory book punctures the official propaganda and shows the class war underpinning the politics of the Colombian cocaine trade.

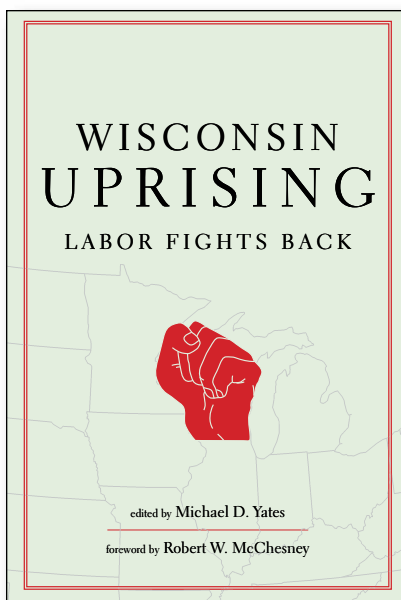
Foreword by ROBERT W. MCCHESENEY

In early 2011, the nation was stunned to watch Wisconsin's state capitol in Madison come under sudden and unexpected occupation by union members and their allies. The protests to defend collective bargaining rights were militant and practically unheard of in this era of declining union power. Nearly forty years of neoliberalism and the most severe economic crisis since the Great Depression have battered the labor movement, and workers have been largely complacent in the face of stagnant wages, slashed benefits and services, widening unemployment, and growing inequality.

That is, until now. Under pressure from a union-busting governor and his supporters in the legislature, workers in Wisconsin shook the nation with their colossal display of solidarity and outrage. This timely book brings together some of the best labor journalists and scholars in the United States, many of whom were on the ground at the time, to examine the causes and impact of events, and suggest how the labor movement might proceed in this new era of union militancy.

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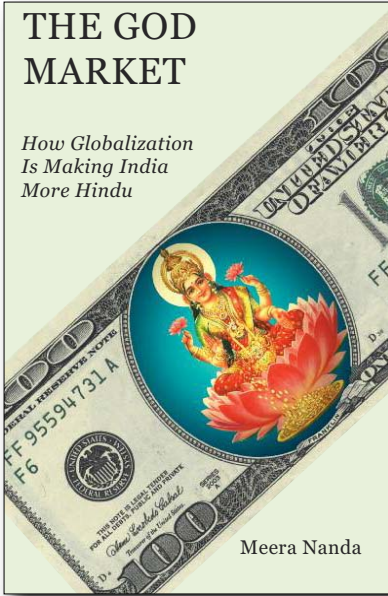

THE GOD MARKET

How Globalization is Making India More Hindu

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MEERA NANDA was trained as a biologist and is a writer, philosopher, and scientist. Her books include *Postmodernism and Religious Fundamentalism: A Scientific Rebuttal to Hindu Science*. She is a fellow of the Jawaharlal Nehru Institute for Advanced Study.

Conventional wisdom says that integration into the global marketplace tends to weaken the power of traditional faith in developing countries. But, as Meera Nanda argues in this path-breaking book, this is hardly the case in today's India. Against expectations of growing secularism, India has instead seen a remarkable intertwining of Hinduism and neoliberal ideology, spurred on by a growing capitalist class. It is this "State-Temple-Corporate Complex," she claims, that now wields decisive political and economic power, and provides ideological cover for the dismantling of the Nehru-era state-dominated economy.

According to this new logic, India's rapid economic growth is attributable to a special "Hindu mind," and it is what separates the nation's Hindu population from Muslims and others deemed to be "anti-modern." As a result, Hindu institutions are replacing public ones, and the Hindu "revival" itself has become big business, a major source of capital accumulation. Nanda explores the roots of this development and its possible future, as well as the struggle for secularism and socialism in the world's second-most populous country.

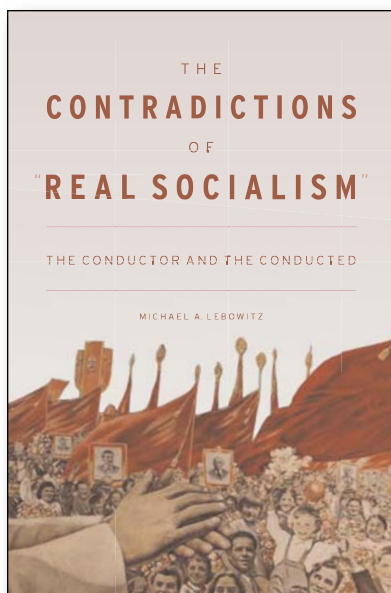

THE CONTRADICTIONS OF “REAL SOCIALISM”

The Conductor and the Conducted

MICHAEL A. LEBOWITZ is professor emeritus of economics at Simon Fraser University in Vancouver, Canada, and the author of several books including *The Socialist Alternative* and *Beyond Capital: Marx's Political Economy of the Working Class* (winner of the Isaac Deutscher Memorial Prize for 2004). He is Director, Program in Transformative Practice and Human Development, Centro Internacional Miranda, in Caracas, Venezuela.

In this concise volume, noted scholar and economist Michael A. Lebowitz considers the legacy of twentieth century socialist societies, or what some have termed “real socialism.” While these societies were able to claim major achievements in areas from health care to education to popular culture, they nonetheless met limited success in eroding what Marx called the “opposition of the worker as direct producer and the proprietor of the means of production.” That this opposition between workers and managers continued to exist in one form or another under “real socialism” means that, according to Lebowitz, a crucial aspect of the socialist project was lost.

During every process of production, human beings are transformed just as are the materials with which they work, and unless this process puts at its center the development of full, creative, and free people, it can only resemble the most dehumanizing aspects of “real capitalism.” The question of how the production process is organized—whether it resembles a symphony with its rigid hierarchy between conductor and conducted, or whether it resembles a jazz ensemble with its more cooperative and improvisational structure—is a crucial to any evaluation of past attempts to build socialism and the ongoing struggle for a more egalitarian and democratic society.

South Africa is in crisis and the white state is under siege. They threaten to "break her or hang her" if she does not lead them to her lover, "Red" Ronnie Kasrils, who is wanted on suspicion of involvement in recent acts of sabotage.

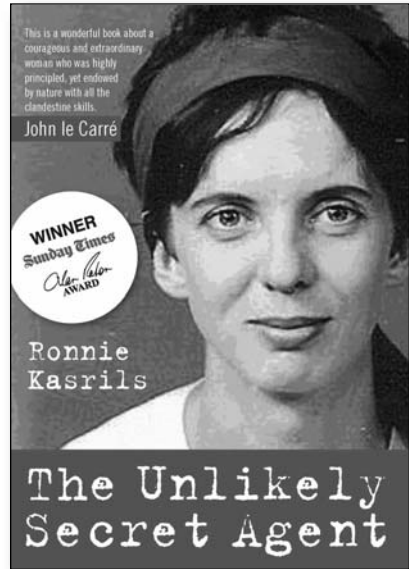

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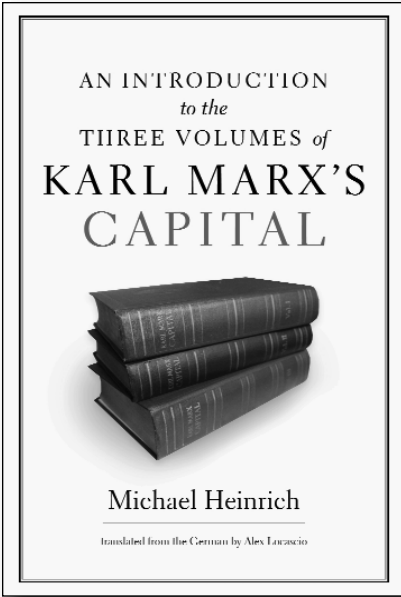

MICHAEL HEINRICH teaches economics in Berlin and is managing editor of *PROKLA: Journal for Critical Social Science*. He is the author of *The Science of Value: Marx's Critique of Political Economy between Scientific Revolution and Classical Tradition*, and editor, with Werner Bonefeld, of *Capital and Critique: After the "New Reading" of Marx*.

Heinrich's modern interpretation of *Capital*, available to English-speaking readers for the first time, has gone through nine editions in Germany and is the standard work for Marxist study groups and German universities. The author systematically covers all three volumes of *Capital* and explains all the basic aspects of Marx's critique of capitalism in a way that is clear and concise. He provides background information on the intellectual and political milieu in which Marx worked, and looks at crucial issues beyond the scope of *Capital*, such as class struggle, the relationship between capital and the state, accusations of historical determinism, and Marx's understanding of communism. Uniquely, Heinrich emphasizes the monetary character of Marx's work, in addition to the traditional emphasis on the labor theory of value, thus highlighting the relevance of *Capital* to the age of financial explosions and implosions.

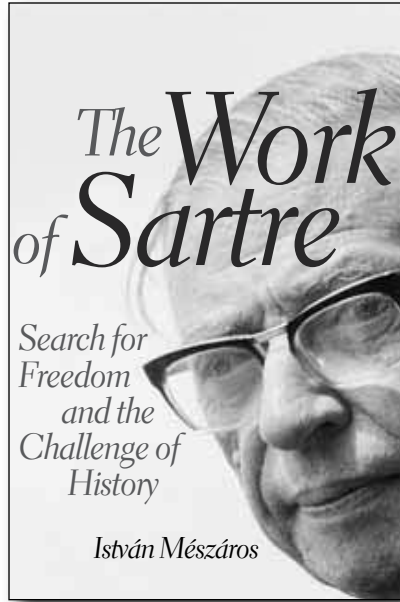

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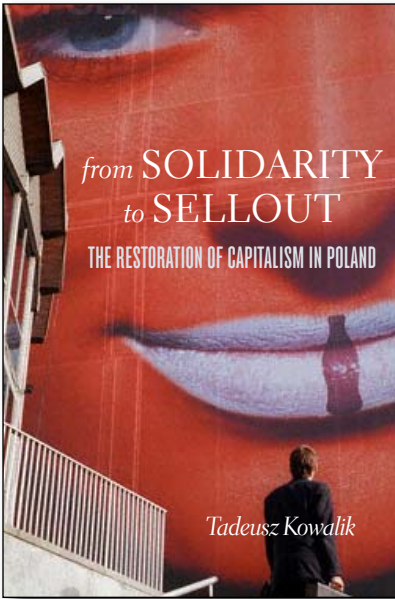

FROM SOLIDARITY TO SELLOUT

The Restoration of Capitalism in Poland

TADEUSZ KOWALIK is an economist, public intellectual, and political activist. He studied under Oscar Lange and was editor of Lange's works, as well as the works of Michal Kalecki (with J. Osiatyński). He has held academic posts in Poland and abroad and is the author of many books and articles. In the 1970s, he was an active leader of the Polish workers movement and, later, in the Solidarity movement and the Union of Labor party.

In the 1980s and 90s, renowned Polish economist Tadeusz Kowalik played a leading role in the Solidarity movement, struggling alongside workers for an alternative to “really-existing socialism” that was cooperative and controlled by the workers themselves. In the ensuing two decades, “really-existing” socialism has collapsed, capitalism has been restored, and Poland is now among the most unequal countries in the world. Kowalik asks, how could this happen in a country that once had the largest and most militant labor movement in Europe?

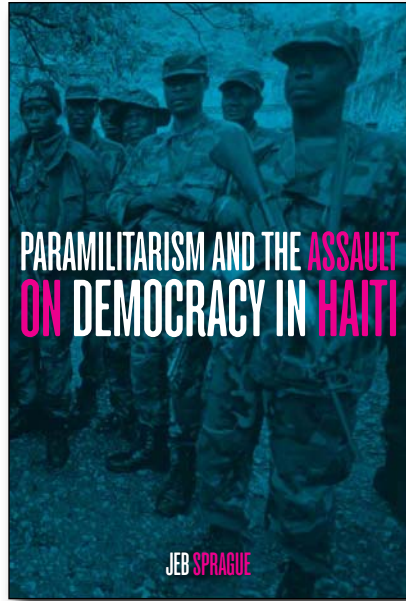
This book takes readers inside the debates within Solidarity, academic and intellectual circles, and the Communist Party over the future of Poland and competing visions of society. Kowalik argues that the failures of the Communist Party, combined with the power of the Catholic Church and interference from the United States, subverted efforts to build a cooperative and democratic economic order in the 1990s. Instead, Poland was subjected to a harsh return to the market, resulting in the wildly unequal distribution of the nation's productive property—often in the hands of former political rulers, who, along with foreign owners, constitute the new capitalist class. Kowalik aptly terms the transformation from command to market economy an epigone bourgeois revolution, and asks if a new social transformation is still possible in Poland.

PARAMILITARISM AND THE ASSAULT ON DEMOCRACY IN HAITI

JEB SPRAGUE

In this path-breaking book, Jeb Sprague investigates the dangerous world of right-wing paramilitarism in Haiti and its role in undermining the democratic aspirations of the Haitian people. Sprague focuses on the period beginning in 1990 with the rise of Haiti's first democratically elected president, Jean-Bertrand Aristide, and the right-wing movements that succeeded in driving him from power. Over the ensuing two decades, paramilitary violence directed against the poor and supporters of Aristide's Lavalas movement was widespread, and took the lives of thousands of Haitians. Sprague seeks to understand how this occurred, and traces connections between paramilitaries and their elite financial and political backers, in Haiti but also in the United States and the Dominican Republic.

The product of years of original research, this book draws on over three dozen interviews—some of which placed the author in severe danger—and more than 11,000 documents secured through Freedom of Information Act requests. It makes a substantial contribution to our understanding of Haiti today, and is a vivid reminder of how democratic struggles in poor countries are often met with extreme violence organized at the behest of capital.

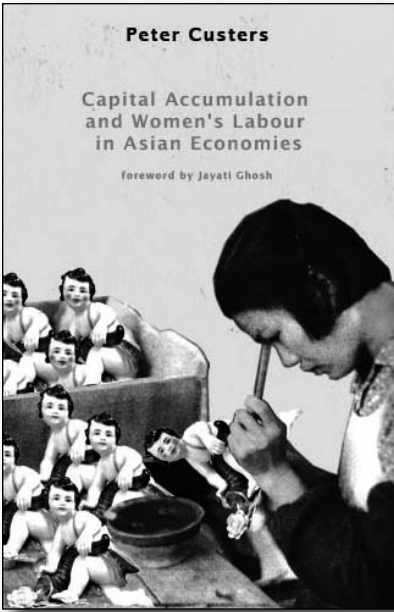

PETER CUSTERS is a theoretician and international campaigner. For many years he has worked to support class struggles waged by landless peasants in Bangladesh and south Asia. He is a member of IDEAs (International Development Economics Associates) and of the Euro-Memorandum Group, and the author of *Questioning Globalized Militarism*.

The global impact of Asian production of the wage goods consumed in North America and Europe is only now being recognized, and is far from being understood. The intensive labor for minimal wages of Asian women, most only recently urbanized and in the waged work force, is at the center of a process that has upended the entire global economy. First published in 1997, this prescient study is the best available summary of this crucial process as it took hold at the very end of the twentieth century. This new edition brings the discussion up to 2011 with an extensive introduction by world-famous economist Jayati Ghosh of Delhi's Jawaharlal Nehru University.

Peter Custers reasserts the relevance of Marxist concepts for understanding processes of socio-economic change in Asia and the world, but argues forcefully that these concepts need to be enlarged to include the perspective of feminist theoreticians. With its strong theoretical framework, and abundant evidence, this important book will interest all those involved in women's studies, social movements, economics, sociology, and social and economic theory.

In his new extensively revised and expanded edition of this book, Samir Amin suggests new approaches to Marxian analysis of the crisis of the late capitalist system of generalized, financialized, and globalized oligopolies following on the financial collapse of 2008.

Amin sees the present crisis as a moment in the second long crisis of the capitalist system, dating from the early 1970’s (the first long crisis, he maintains, lasted from 1873 until 1945). He sees no exit from repeated crises under capitalism except the descent into barbarism. The challenge is not to escape from the crisis of capitalism—a hopeless project—but to escape from capitalism in crisis. And Amin reasserts his historical optimism as to the socialist project. He expects a “second wave” of socialist attempts that will stem from the self-liberating efforts of the nations and peoples of the South which, by eliminating the imperialist rent, will lead to an awakening of the Northern popular classes to join the awakening of the global South. This book has an important place among the theoretical resources for anyone involved in the study of contemporary Marxian economic and political theory.

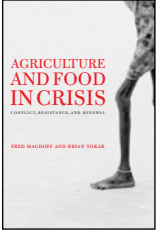
