By the 1960s and 1970s, diverse groups formed strong bonds with the Black Panther Party. The Black Panther Party (BPP) was a revolutionary socialist organization that sought to create a more equitable society through armed self-defense and community programs. The BPP was founded in 1966 in Oakland, California, by Huey P. Newton and Bobby Seale. The party's name was chosen to honor the Black Panther, a symbol of strength and resistance. The BPP's most famous slogan was "Power to the People... Then and Now." The party's community programs, such as the Black Panther Breakfast Program, provided essential services to the Black community. The BPP's legacy is remembered today for its role in the Civil Rights Movement and its commitment to social justice.
