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PHOTO REQUESTS FROM SOLITARY

Photo Requests from Solitary (PRFS) invites men and women in solitary confinement to request a photograph of anything at all, real or imagined, and promises to find an artist to make the image. The astonishing requests have ranged from "a picture of my family in St. Louis" to "a gray and white 'warmblood' horse rearing in weather cold enough to see its breath" to "the place where the Robert Taylor Homes used to be."

The pictures offer a new way to think about the experience of solitary confinement. Viewers are able to see not what the prisoners see, but what they envision. Taken together, these requests provide an archive of the hopes, interests, and memories of people in isolation.

Though foremost a form of support to people in isolation, the project has also helped to publicize the harm of solitary confinement. PRFS was started in 2009 by Tamms Year Ten, a grassroots coalition advocating for the reform or closure of Tamms Correctional Center, a supermax prison in Illinois. A year after the campaign was launched, Governor Pat Quinn introduced a reform plan, and in 2012, he proposed closing the prison outright. In spite of tremendous opposition from the guards' union and downstate legislators, Quinn succeeded in closing Tamms in January 2013.

The project is now a partnership between Solitary Watch, Parsons School of Design at the New School, and Tamms Year Ten, which together have expanded the scope of the project to include prisoners in California and New York, two states with high rates of people in solitary confinement. PRFS is housed at solitarywatch.org.

Photo Requests from Solitary is currently organized by Jean Casella/Solitary Watch; Jeanine Oleson/Parsons School of Design at the New School; and Laurie Jo Reynolds/Tamms Year Ten. Lauren Denitzio provides administrative support.

When PRFS was housed at Tamms Year Ten, it was organized by Laurie Jo Reynolds, Jeanine Oleson, Rachel Herman, Laura Hsieh, Scott McFarland, Sarah Jane Rhee, and Sarah Ross.

Photo Requests from Solitary, a project started in 2009 by Tamms Year Ten, has been covered by *Vice* (October 2015), the *Daily Mail* (October 2015), *BuzzFeed* (November 2013), and the *Daily Beast* (May 2013), among others. A selection of the photographs was shown in 2013 at Photoville, New York, in an exhibition curated by Jean Casella/Solitary Watch, Jeanine Oleson/Parsons School of Design at the New School, and Laurie Jo Reynolds/Tamms Year Ten.


BALD KNOB CROSS: WILLIE

Willie requested a picture of a vigil at Bald Knob Cross, on top of a mountain in southern Illinois, with people praying for his deliverance from Tamms and his being granted parole from prison. In order to take this photograph, Tamms Year Ten caravaned down to the cross, held a litany of song and prayer, and celebrated with a dinner. The next day, members of Tamms Year Ten drove family members to visit loved ones at the prison. Willie was transferred from Tamms, and on July 27, 2012, he was paroled after thirty-six years. Tamms Year Ten and Photo Requests from Solitary had a welcome home party for him the week of his return. Robert, a man with a serious mental illness, sent Tamms Year Ten a photo of his mother, who had died the previous year. Because he had no family and no visitors, he was desolate. He asked for an image of "my mother standing in front of a mansion, or Big Castle, with a bunch of money on the ground. OR if you can't do that, THEN a substitution is a big mansion or castle with a bunch of money in front of it and a black hummer parked in front of it. I truly appreciate this a lot. ... Several men asked for photos of themselves, taken from their online Department of Corrections photos, to give to their families. Robert wanted his picture matched with an alternate background. He wrote, "If you can place my picture on another background, nothing too much please. Something simple like a blue sky with clouds or a sunset in the distance would be fine." Robert also said, "I want to extend my love to you, for you, as you have already done for me.
