NSW RUGBY CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Welcome to the 2023 NSW Rugby Union (NSWRU) Annual Report. It is my pleasure to present this Annual Report, my third as the Chairman of the NSWRU Board.

The NSWRU Board acknowledges the traditional owners and custodians of country throughout Australia and acknowledges their continuing connection to land, sea and culture. We pay our respects to all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and to their elders past, present and emerging.

Following the Wallabies performance at the 2023 Rugby World Cup, you would have heard and read a lot about the concept of centralisation, an initiative from Rugby Australia to align the five Super Rugby clubs in a collaborative way, to improve the standards and success of rugby at all levels of the game. I am pleased to report that NSW Rugby and Rugby Australia (RA) have worked in collaboration to agree a new fully-integrated model for the delivery of professional rugby. This includes a new contracting model for players through to improving our pathways and player development programs.

NSW Rugby is taking the lead in delivering this new model for Rugby in Australia. We are working with RA as part of the strategy to unite and act collectively to create a vision for the game and build a new structure that will deliver improved results both on and off the field. Driving this initiative is the goal of delivering long-term success for our men's and women's teams at Super Rugby level and to produce high quality players that can contribute to the success of our national sides.

NSW Rugby is also dealing with a very real financial challenge. The increasing costs of professional rugby against diminishing returns from commercial activities, plus reduced funding from RA means that we've had to make clear decisions, focusing on what has to happen for the good of the game.

From 1 January 2024, a new Board was created for the NSW Waratahs with directors appointed by RA and NSW Rugby, with this joint governance model supporting the coordination and cohesion of professional rugby in NSW. RA will fund 100% of the NSW Waratahs programs.

This new model will maximise the benefits from coordinating high-performance programs and implementing strategies and initiatives to drive improved results for professional rugby both on and off the field. The new model recognises that the Waratahs knowledge, expertise and experience in our own local market, with members, sponsors, the stadium, will be vital in working with RA in supporting the national program.

We believe this reform is in the best interest of NSW Rugby, the NSW Waratahs and rugby in Australia.

The shared governance and high performance model and NSW Rugby's willingness to work collaboratively with all Unions will achieve the success that will drive the positive change in rugby that is long overdue.

The integrated approach still allows for local delivery and will maintain the proud history of NSW Rugby and the Waratahs which is critically important as we celebrate our 150th Anniversary in 2024. Assets such as the \$20m high performance centre 'NSW Rugby HQ' which opened in 2022 and the NSW Waratahs trademarks and the intellectual property will remain under the ownership of NSW Rugby.

The NSW Rugby Union Board will stay in place and will continue to take full responsibility for the community game and for delivering programs to grow the game, to attract more participants, to improve pathways and create an environment for more people to become involved in rugby.

In prioritising the community game, NSW Rugby will be able to focus all of its resources into supporting the game, players, coaches, officials and volunteers. On that front, as you will read in this report, considerable progress has been made, including additional media and promotion, technology development, streaming and fundraising opportunities via Government and donors.

My congratulations to Mark Ella AM and Dr Myles Coolican who were inducted as Life Members at last year's AGM. Al Baxter was appointed at last year's AGM for his second term as President but due to work commitments resigned in July. Al had the rare distinction of being on the Board during and subsequent to his playing career initially as the RUPA Representative and later as a Director, Vice President and President, as well as being a member of the High Performance Committee. He was instrumental on the Project Control Group for building the Centre of Excellence at Daceyville. A wonderful career on and off the field. Thank you Al.

Sadly, we saw the passing of two Honorary Life Members - Ms Robin Timmins OAM and Mr Richard "Dick" Shaw. Both individuals' service and contribution to the game of rugby in NSW was immense and they will be sorely missed. Our Oldest Waratah Eric Tweedale (13 caps 1946-50) and distinguished Wallaby and Waratah Rob Hemming (16 caps 1958-66) passed away during the year. Our sincere condolences to their families.

Navigating the structural changes that I have touched upon would not have been possible without a loyal and dedicated executive team so ably lead by our CEO Paul Doorn, or the commitment of my fellow board members. Thank you all for your continued support in navigating what has been a challenging year. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank retiring NSWRU Board Directors Katrina Rathie, who retired on 31 December 2023 (Member Jan 2020 – Dec 2023), as well as Richard Harry and David Harrison who will retire from the Board at the AGM (Jan 2020 – April 2024). Our Deputy Chair John Morrison, recently has advised he will also retire at the AGM. This is John's 9th season on the Board as the Suburban Rugby Appointed Director. Thank you all for your considerable contribution to the good governance of NSW Rugby.

NSW RUGBY CEO'S REPORT

It's been a very busy year for all involved and I would like to particularly take this opportunity to acknowledge the thousands of volunteers, club administrators as well as officials and referees, who dedicate so much of their time to ensuring rugby can be enjoyed by all. From the mums and dads who put their hand up at their club to support junior rugby, to the club volunteers who ensure our grounds are ready for competitions, through to the countless other individuals who take on roles that make rugby a true community and family sport. On behalf of NSW Rugby, thank you.

With the support of these volunteers, officials, our Affiliates, sponsors, partners and finally a break in the weather (2023 gave us our first full year without any COVID or extreme wet weather interruptions or restrictions), we continued to invest and support initiatives to grow the game in NSW and as a result:

- ▶ Traditional Club XV player numbers increased from 2022 to 2023.
- Our Club participation numbers almost returned to pre-COVID levels.
- ► Regular school XVs rugby participation remained steady.
- ► Female participation continued to grow with numbers increasing across all levels and across all formats at club and school.
- ► The five-week Get into Rugby Program saw a 27% increase with 8,147 school students having participated in the program.
- Regular school 7s competitions more than doubled to 4,186 participants reaching a record high with new Catholic Secondary School competitions attracting over 1,500 players.
- Our coaching and refereeing numbers increased with over 3,100 accredited coaches and almost 900 referees across the state supported by more than 80 coach and match official courses being held throughout NSW.
- ▶ NSW Rugby digital following increased by 20%.
- ➤ On NSW Rugby TV over 1,600 games were streamed across NSW including Sydney Rugby Union, NSW Suburban, Country Championships and club matches, Junior Championships and representatives fixtures, Schools and Women's matches.

Whilst winning at the highest levels is important for fan engagement and

commercial outcomes – a key feature of the NSW Rugby Strategic Plan ("to be the leading provincial rugby organisation in the world") involves growing the number of people playing and enjoying the game of rugby. A key element of this engagement between the professional game and 'grassroots' rugby is the interaction between players and fans – this includes after matches, as well as school and club visits and corporate events.

In 2023, representatives from the Waratahs women's team undertook 214 hours and our men's team 600 hours of community rugby appearances. This level of engagement flowed into other areas as well. With the return to the new Sydney Football Stadium, the Waratahs hosted our largest crowd since 2016 in the Round 1 match up against the Brumbies. This was also the largest crowd across the entire regular Super Rugby Pacific competition in 2023 and we also had the largest average crowd attendance across Australian Super Rugby Pacific clubs.

When you compare Waratah games in 2023 with 2022:

- Attendance was up 106%
- Ticket sales up 41%
- Memberships up 36%
- Membership revenue up 97%
- Year on year growth continued across our social media channels, and by year's end we had over 360,000 followers.

Despite these revenue-driving initiatives, after a four-year absence from the Sydney Football Stadium while the new stadium was being constructed, the sources of income for membership, gate takings from home games, and sponsorship revenue in 2023 were lower than expected. Lower home game attendance and a poor win/loss record challenged our income sources. Broadcast revenue distributed to the Super Rugby Clubs via Rugby Australia also declined. In addition, fixed costs remained for players, coaches and the high-performance program. This imbalance has been a significant contributor to financial stress for all Australian Super Rugby Clubs, including the Waratahs.

As a result of these financial pressures, NSW Rugby will record a deficit in 2023 of \$4.8m.

As outlined in the Chairman's Report, NSW Rugby and Rugby Australia have reached an agreement to transfer the responsibility for the NSW Waratahs professional rugby business from NSW Rugby to Rugby Australia from 1 January 2024. From that date, Rugby Australia takes responsibility for the Waratahs' assets and liabilities, and commercial arrangements. Assets such as NSW Rugby's HQ and high-performance centre at Daceyville in Sydney will remain under the ownership of NSW Rugby as will the Waratahs trademarks which NSW Rugby will licence to the Waratahs entities.

NSW Rugby will continue to take full responsibility for the community game, which of course includes delivering programs to grow the game, to attract more participants, to improve pathways and to create an environment for more people to become involved in rugby.

I want to pay tribute to the NSW Rugby Board, our Affiliates, staff, players, officials, volunteers and fans who continue to support and grow the game. Each one makes a meaningful impact in our community and beyond. Thank you also to outgoing Super W Head Coach Campbell Aikten. Campbell's five-year contribution to women's rugby in our organisation has been nothing short of remarkable. We extend our heartfelt thanks to him for his dedication and wish him the very best in his future endeavours.

RUGBY REPORTS



WARATAHS MEN'S REPORT

After four years of travelling NSW for home games, the NSW Waratahs returned to Allianz Stadium in 2023. The opening game against the ACT Brumbies boasted attendance of 25,076 which was the biggest crowd of the entire Super Rugby 2023 season.

Despite falling short to the ACT Brumbies in Round 1, the Waratahs showed hopeful signs of what was to come for the remainder of the season. In his debut, Max Jorgensen sent warning signs to the rest of the competition displaying impressive ball skills and scoring two tries.

The son of Peter Jorgenson, Max and his father join an exclusive and esteemed father/son group of NSW Waratahs players. Following an outstanding season, Max was named the winner of the Chris Whitaker Aspiring Medal and a member of the Wallabies Rugby World Cup Squad.

The NSW Waratahs had an impressive sixteen debutants throughout the 2023 season with Fijian-Australian Nemani Nadolo amongst the most notable. Nadolo made a name for himself in the 2014 Super Rugby season as the top try scorer and is known for his size and speed. Unfortunately back-to-back injuries sidelined Nadolo for much of the 2023 season.

Across the season several players stood out for their individual performances with 10 named in the Bledisloe Cup squad to take on New Zealand and seven named in the Wallabies squad for the 2023 Rugby World Cup.

In his last season at the Waratahs, Michael Hooper was awarded the Matthew Burke Cup for a record eighth time. Hooper's outstanding form also saw him voted player of the year by his peers and he finished with 65 matches as captain, which is more than any other NSW captain.

The NSW Waratahs ultimately finished the season in sixth place matching their result from 2022. In their quarter-final against the Auckland Blues, the Waratahs were missing their captain Jake Gordon who was unavailable to help his team advance further into the finals due to injury. For the fourth year in a row, Gordon took home the men's best back award at the 2023 Season Awards night.

The Super Rugby pacific trophy was again taken home by the Crusaders who defeated the Chiefs in a close final with only five points separating them at full-time.

WARATAHS WOMEN'S REPORT

The NSW Waratahs Women continued to break Super W records in 2023, once again claiming the most regular season wins and boasting the biggest win against both Western Force and Fijian Drua.

The team started the Buildcorp Super W 2023 season in the best possible way remaining undefeated throughout the round games.

This was Fijian Drua's second year in the competition and although the Waratahs defeated them in the round games, our team faced a strong Fijian outfit in the semi-finals and for the first time in the Super W competition, the Waratahs were halted in their pursuit for the championship and did not advance to the Final.

The Buildcorp Super W season began at the newly built Allianz Stadium in front of a home crowd where the Waratahs held the Western Force scoreless. Fielding a younger looking Waratahs team consisting of nine debutants, Ella Ryan shone in her debut scoring four goals for the team. Piper Duck became the youngest NSW captain on record banking two tries to open her season and cement her position as a leader both on and off the field. Maya Stewart scored her 20th try for NSW pushing her above 100 points scored for NSW.

The Waratahs continued to show their dominance during the round games holding off the Rebels and keeping Fijiana to their lowest score of the Super W competition.

In the fourth regular game of the season, the team showed tenacity to overcome Queensland by a single point. It was the closest Super W score of the 2023 competition.

The NSW Waratahs fielded thirteen debutants during the 2023 season. Making her debut in Round 1 at the age of 16 years, six months and six days, Caitlyn Halse was the most notable as she became the youngest men's or women's player to take to the field for NSW.

Piper Duck was voted by the coaching staff as the Waratahs Women Player of the Year.

COMMUNITY REPORT

NSW COMMUNITY RUGBY

Community rugby was in full swing in 2023 as we experienced our first year without Covid or extreme wet weather interruptions or restrictions.

Traditional club XV player numbers increased by two percent compared to 2022, with regular school's XV participation remaining steady. Pleasingly our club participation numbers have almost returned to pre-Covid levels (within 1%). Individual engagement with the sport has declined since Covid and there are fewer matches played per person which is placing a strain on clubs trying to field the requisite number of teams. Rugby, like all team sports must continue to evolve to ensure that we cater to the needs of the modern player, and this includes exploring tactics such as shorter seasons, pay as you go and timing of games.

Female participation continues to be the shining light of community rugby in NSW with numbers increasing at all levels and across all formats at club and school. 8,147 school students participated in a five-week Get into Rugby Program (which marked a 27% increase). Regular school 7s competitions more than doubled to 4,186 participants reaching a record high while a new catholic secondary schools competition attracted over 1,500 players. Our accredited coaching numbers also increased to 3,100 and there are now almost 900 referees across the state.

We were saddened by the sudden loss of Robin Timmins, a former colleague of 48 years, Life Member and pioneer of women in rugby. I was honoured to deliver one of the eulogies at her funeral. Robin's wonderful service to the game was evidenced through a long list of accolades including a Medal of the Order of Australia and World Rugby Development Award, Life Membership of NSW Rugby Union (NSWRU), the NSW Rugby Referees Association and Sydney West Referees Association. Robin was Australia's first female referee and a devotee of the Wallabies, NSW Waratahs, Eastwood Rugby Club and referees. She will be sorely missed by the rugby community.

We also extend our condolences to the family of Andrew Wisemantel. Andrew was a legend of schoolboy rugby and held administration and coaching positions with NSW Schools, ISA and Oakhill College.

As part of the Rugby World Cup 2027 legacy program, we joined forces with Rugby Australia (RA) on a club development officer initative to provide assistance with club and zone development. To complement this, NSWRU worked with RA and The Rugby Club Foundation to develop an online resource clubhub.rugby to provide best practise resources for staff and clubs at the click of a button. Both initiatives will continue to expand over the coming years.

At the beginning of the season, RA, NSWRU, NSW Suburban Rugby and Sydney Rugby Union worked together to integrate the front-end registration systems of Fusesport and Rugby Xplorer. This seamless transition should not be underestimated and now provides a truly national registration system. All parties should be congratulated for their work to achieve this.

35 of our top female rugby volunteer ambassadors from across NSW were invited to attend the inaugural Her Sport Her Way Women on Board Conference, funded by an Office of Sport grant which aimed to upskill and arm participants with the latest trends and techniques that could be imparted on clubs and zones. The women were guests of the Union for the Chiefs game and attended several workshops and presentations. Thanks to Katrina Rathie, Amy Perrett and Kerry Chikarovski for appearing at the panel discussion.

With a view to safety, NSWRU took the lead and agreed with RA to introduce a lowering of the tackle height for the 2024 season. Research showed that such a move lowers the risk of concussion 4.2 times. We look forward to rolling out education to all stakeholders across the 2024 pre-season.

In an effort to improve NSWRU's profile and highlight the many and varied activities that are undertaken year-round, NSWRU employed a dedicated Community Media Coordinator to manage the newly created and dedicated NSW Rugby digital channels. There is much work to be done in this area however NSWRU's digital following increased by 20% across the year.

With Covid behind us, player appearances doubled to 600 hours and the Sydney Junior Club Blitz once again proved popular with over 40 clubs visited. This was complimented by a Country Blitz with players visiting Western Plains, Central West, Far North Coast and Illawarra.

The NSWRU community team continues to expand following the success of the Positive Rugby Foundation's fundraising efforts. I offer my sincere thanks to the community group for their commitment and dedication to their jobs. Their passion for the game is evident in their work ethic and the rugby community thanks you for your efforts.

Thanks to The Rugby Club Foundation (TRCF) for its continued support of the NSW Development Officer Program, which sees Development Officers appointed in the Mid North Coast, Far North Coast, Illawarra and Sydney regions. TRCF provided over \$500,000 in support across 25 grassroots initiatives throughout 2023. This generous support ensures a wide variety of new initiatives are undertaken to grow the game and ensure costs are kept to a minimum.

Thanks to all the volunteers including the coaches, club administrators, referees, referee coaches, match officials as well as affiliate committees who strive to ensure that everyone has access to rugby in

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Your directors present their report on the consolidated entity consisting of New South Wales Rugby Union Ltd and the entities it controlled at the end of, or during, the year ended 31 December 2023. Throughout the report, the consolidated entity is referred to as the Group. New South Wales Rugby Union Ltd is deemed to control NSW Waratahs Limited and its subsidiary, Waratahs Rugby Pty Ltd as a result of a change in the entities constitutions with effect from 1 January 2019.

Directors

The following persons held office as directors of New South Wales Rugby Union Ltd during the financial year:

Principal activities

The principal activities of the Group during the financial year were the organisation, development and promotion of the game of rugby union in the State of New South Wales and the business operations and management of a professional rugby union team.

Review of operations

The loss from ordinary activities amounted to \$4,870,780 (2022 profit: \$217,387).

Significant changes in the state of affairs

On 14 November 2023 control of the NSW Waratahs Ltd moved from New South Wales Rugby Union Ltd ('NSWRU') to Rugby Australia Limited (RA). A Deed of Transfer was executed on this date which meant that RA assumed full responsibility for funding and managing all activities associated with the Professional Rugby Business (as defined in the Transfer Deed) from 1 January 2024.

Event since the end of the financial year

On 14 November 2023 control of the NSW Waratahs Ltd moved from New South Wales Rugby Union Ltd ('NSWRU') to Rugby Australia Limited (RA). A Deed of Transfer was executed on this date which meant that RA assumed full responsibility for funding and managing all activities associated with the Professional Rugby Business (as defined in the Transfer Deed) from 1 January 2024.

No other matter or circumstance has arisen since 31 December 2023 that has significantly affected the Company's operations, results, or state of affairs, or may do so in future years.

Likely developments and expected results of operations

With effect from 1 January 2024, the NSW Waratahs Ltd will be controlled by Rugby Australia Ltd and will therefore not be included in the Group's annual reports going forward. As such it would be inappropriate for the directors to comment on future developments of the NSW Waratahs Ltd. Further information on likely developments in the operations of the continuing Group and the expected results of operations have not been included in this annual report because of the sensitivity and confidentiality in nature which the directors believe would likely result in unreasonable prejudice to the continuing entity.

Environmental regulation

The Group is not affected by any significant environmental regulation in respect of its operations.

Limited by guarantee

The Company is a company limited by guarantee. In the event of the Company being wound up each member is liable to contribute to the debts of the Company incurred whilst they were a member or within one year from them ceasing to be member, or for the purpose of adjusting the rights of the contributors amongst themselves, such amount as may be required not exceeding \$10.

Indemnification

Since the end of the previous financial year, the Group has not indemnified or made a relevant agreement for indemnifying against a liability any person who is or has been an officer or auditor of the Group.

The Group has agreed to indemnify their auditors, PricewaterhouseCoopers, to the extent permitted by law, against any claim by third party arising from the Group's breach of their agreement.

Insurance of officers

During the financial year, New South Wales Rugby Union Ltd has paid premium in respect of directors' and officers' liability for legal expenses and insurance contracts. Such insurance contracts insure against certain liability (subject to specific exclusions) persons who are or have been directors or executive officers of the Company.

The directors have not included details of the nature of the liabilities covered or the amount of the amount of the premiums paid in respect of the directors' and officers' liability and legal expenses insurance contracts, as such disclosure is prohibited under the terms of the contract.

Proceedings on behalf of the company

No person has applied to the Court under section 237 of the *Corporations Act 2001* for leave to bring proceedings on behalf of the Company, or to intervene in any proceedings to which the Company is a party, for the purpose of taking responsibility on behalf of the Company for all or part of those proceedings.

No proceedings have been brought or intervened in on behalf of the Company with leave of the Court under section 237 of the *Corporations Act 2001*.

Contents of the notes to the consolidated financial statements

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1 Summary of material accounting policies

This note provides a list of the material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these consolidated financial statements. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated. The financial statements are for the Group consisting of New South Wales Rugby Union Ltd and its subsidiaries.

(a) Basis of preparation

These general-purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the *Corporations Act 2001*. New South Wales Rugby Union Ltd is a not-for-profit entity for the purpose of preparing the financial statements.

(i) Compliance with Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosure Requirements

The consolidated financial statements of the Group comply with Australian Accounting Standards – Simplified Disclosure Requirements as issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB).

The Company is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. The address of the Company's registered office and principal place of business is David Phillips Sports Complex, Banks Avenue, Daceyville, NSW 2032.

(ii) Historical cost convention

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

(iii) New standards and interpretations

The group has applied the following standards and amendments for first time for their annual reporting period commencing 1 January 2023:

 AASB 2020-3 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Annual Improvements 2018-2020 and Other Amendments [AASB 1, AASB 3, AASB 9, AASB 116, AASB 137 and AASB 141].

The amendments listed above did not have any impact on the amounts recognised in prior periods and are not expected to significantly affect the current or future periods.



1 Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

(a) Basis of preparation (continued)

(iv) Going concern

The directors believe that the going concern basis of preparation is appropriate.

The Group has a prima facie going concern issue at 31 December 2023 with a total deficit equity of \$692,775 (2022: equity of \$4,178,005). The liabilities in this deficit equity include \$6,978,525 of deferred revenue which do not represent a cash liability. The net current assets of the group total \$1,551,876 (2022: \$5,737,071) including \$5,162,806 in cash resources (2022: \$7,177,668).

New South Wales Rugby Union Ltd ('NSWRU') at 31 December 2023 as a standalone company has total equity of \$2,374,002 (2022: \$2,624,690), net current assets of \$9,959,742 (2022: \$194,104) and net assets of \$2,374,002 (2022: \$2,624,690) and \$6,372,440 in cash resources (2022: \$2,399,992).

Pursuant to a Deed of Transfer dated 14 November 2023 between the NSWRU and Rugby Australia Ltd ('Transfer Deed'), Rugby Australia Ltd ('RA') took control of NSW Waratahs Ltd and therefore became responsible for funding and managing the Professional Rugby Business (as defined in the Transfer Deed) with effect from 1 January 2024. As a result of the above transfer of control, the NSW RU Group will no longer include the NSW Waratahs Limited Group, whose loss was the principle contributing factor to the Group's overall operating cashflow deficit.

As a result of the matters noted above, the directors have concluded that at the date of signing these financial statements NSWRU is able to continue as a going concern and therefore, that the Company will have sufficient funds to realise its assets and discharge its liabilities in the normal course of business.

(b) Principles of consolidation

(i) Subsidiaries

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the assets and liabilities of all subsidiaries of New South Wales Rugby Union Ltd ("Company" or "parent entity") as at 31 December 2023 and the results of all subsidiaries for the year then ended. New South Wales Rugby Union Ltd and its subsidiaries together are referred to in these consolidated financial statements as the Company or the Group.

Subsidiaries are all entities (including structured entities) over which the Group has control. The Group controls an entity where the Group is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power to direct the activities of the entity. Subsidiaries are fully consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the Group. They are deconsolidated from the date that control ceases.

Intercompany transactions, balances and unrealised gains on transactions between group companies are eliminated. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of an impairment of the transferred asset. Accounting policies of subsidiaries have been changed where necessary to ensure consistency with the policies adopted by the Group.

1 Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

(c) Foreign currency translation

(i) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements of each of the group's entities are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates ('the functional currency'). The consolidated financial statements are presented in Australian dollars (\$), which is the Group's functional and presentation currency.

(ii) Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at year end exchange rates are generally recognised in profit or loss. They are deferred in equity if they relate to qualifying cash flow hedges and qualifying net investment hedges or are attributable to part of the net investment in a foreign operation.

Foreign exchange gains and losses that relate to borrowings are presented in the consolidated income statement within finance costs. All other foreign exchange gains and losses are presented in the consolidated income statement on a net basis within other gains/(losses).

Non-monetary items that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value was determined. Translation differences on assets and liabilities carried at fair value are reported as part of the fair value gain or loss. For example, translation differences on non-monetary assets and liabilities such as equities held at fair value through profit or loss are recognised in profit or loss as part of the fair value gain or loss and translation differences on non-monetary assets such as at fair value through other comprehensive income are recognised in other comprehensive income.

(d) Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised for the major business activities using the methods outlined below.

Match day tickets and memberships

Revenue from match day tickets and memberships are measured at fair value and taken to income in the period to which it relates.

Sponsorships

Revenue from sponsorship is measured at fair value and recognised evenly on a monthly basis within the financial year to which it relates. Sponsorship advances are deferred until earned pursuant to the sponsorship agreement.

Stadium rebates

Incentives received from host stadiums for matches played are measured at fair value and taken to income in the period in which it relates.

Grants

Government and other grants recognised in profit or loss on a systematic basis over the periods in which the entity recognises as expenses the related costs for which the grants are intended to compensate.

Interest income

Interest revenue is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts though the expected life of the financial asset to that asset's net carrying amount.

(e) Income tax

The Group is exempt from income tax in accordance with the provisions of section 23(g) of the *Income Tax Assessment Act*.

1 Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

(f) Leases

Leases are recognised as a right-of-use asset and a corresponding liability at the date at which the leased asset is available for use by the Group.

Contracts may contain both lease and non-lease components. The Group allocates the consideration in the contract to the lease and non-lease components based on their relative stand-alone prices. However, for leases of real estate for which the Group is a lessee, it has elected not to separate lease and non-lease components and instead accounts for these as a single lease component.

Lease terms are negotiated on an individual basis and contain a wide range of different terms and conditions. The lease agreements do not impose any covenants other than the security interests in the leased assets that are held by the lessor. Leased assets may not be used as security for borrowing purposes.

Assets and liabilities arising from a lease are initially measured on a present value basis. Lease liabilities include the net present value of the following lease payments:

- · fixed payments (including in-substance fixed payments), less any lease incentives receivable
- variable lease payment that are based on an index or a rate, initially measured using the index or rate as at the commencement date
- amounts expected to be payable by the Group under residual value guarantees

Lease payments to be made under reasonably certain extension options are also included in the measurement of the liability.

The lease payments are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease. If that rate cannot be readily determined, which is generally the case for leases in the Group, the lessee's incremental borrowing rate is used, being the rate that the individual lessee would have to pay to borrow the funds necessary to obtain an asset of similar value to the right-of-use asset in a similar economic environment with similar terms, security and conditions.

Lease payments are allocated between principal and finance cost. The finance cost is charged to profit or loss over the lease period so as to produce a constant periodic rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability for each year.

Right-of-use assets are measured at cost comprising the following:

- · the amount of the initial measurement of lease liability
- any lease payments made at or before the commencement date less any lease incentives received
- any initial direct costs, and restoration costs.

Right-of-use assets are generally depreciated over the shorter of the asset's useful life and the lease term on a straight-line basis. If the Group is reasonably certain to exercise a purchase option, the right-of-use asset is depreciated over the underlying asset's useful life.

Payments associated with short-term leases of equipment and vehicles and all leases of low-value assets are recognised on a straight-line basis as an expense in profit or loss. Short-term leases are leases with a lease term of 12 months or less. Low-value assets comprise IT equipment and small items of office furniture.

Variable lease payments

Variable payment terms are used for a variety of reasons, including minimising the fixed costs base. Variable lease payments are recognised in profit or loss in the year in which the condition that triggers those payments occurs.

1 Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

(g) Impairment of assets

Assets are tested for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use. For the purposes of assessing impairment, assets are grouped at the lowest levels for which there are separately identifiable cash inflows which are largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets (cash-generating units). Non-financial assets other than goodwill that suffered an impairment are reviewed for possible reversal of the impairment at the end of each reporting year.

(h) Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of presentation in the consolidated statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities in the consolidated balance sheet.

(i) Trade receivables

Trade receivables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less loss allowance. Trade receivables are generally due for settlement within 30 days. They are presented as current assets unless collection is not expected for more than 12 months after the reporting date.

Collectability of trade receivables is reviewed on an ongoing basis. Debts which are known to be uncollectible are written off by reducing the carrying amount directly. An allowance account is used when there is objective evidence that the Group will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables.

Impairment of receivables

The Group has elected to measure loss allowances on trade receivables using a life-time expected loss model. The Group has applied the simplified approach to measuring expected credit losses, which uses a lifetime expected loss allowance. To measure the expected credit losses, trade receivables have been grouped based on days overdue.

(j) Property, plant and equipment

All property, plant and equipment is stated at historical cost less depreciation. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Group and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of any component accounted for as a separate asset is derecognised when replaced. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to profit or loss during the reporting year in which they are incurred.

Depreciation is calculated using the straight-line method to allocate the cost or revalued amounts of the assets, net of their residual values, over their estimated useful lives or, in the case of leasehold improvements and certain leased plant and equipment, the shorter lease term as follows:

Team and office equipment
 Motor vehicles
 Plant and equipment
 4 - 5 years
 10 years

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting year.



1 Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

(j) Property, plant and equipment (continued)

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount (note 1(g)).

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount. These are included in profit or loss.

(k) Intangible assets

(i) Trademarks

Trademarks are shown at historical cost. Trademarks are recognised at fair value at the acquisition date. They have a finite useful life and are subsequently carried at cost less accumulated amortisation and impairment losses. The Group amortises intangible assets with a limited useful life using the straight-line method over estimated useful lives, which is 10 years.

(I) Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Group prior to the end of financial year which are unpaid. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition. Trade and other payables are presented as current liabilities unless payment is not due within 12 months from the reporting date. They are recognised initially at their fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

(m) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Group has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation and the amount can be reliably estimated. Provisions are not recognised for future operating losses.

Where there are a number of similar obligations, the likelihood that an outflow will be required in settlement is determined by considering the class of obligations as a whole. A provision is recognised even if the likelihood of an outflow with respect to any one item included in the same class of obligations may be small.

Provisions are measured at the present value of management's best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting year. The discount rate used to determine the present value is a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability. The increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognised as interest expense.

(n) Employee benefits

(i) Short-term obligations

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits and accumulating sick leave that are expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service are recognised in respect of employees' services up to the end of the reporting period and are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled. The liabilities are presented as current employee benefit obligations in the consolidated balance sheet.

(ii) Other long-term employee benefit obligations

The liabilities for long service leave and annual leave that are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service. They are therefore measured as the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the end of the reporting period using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the end of the reporting period of high quality corporate bonds with terms and currencies that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

1 Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

(o) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses, and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the taxation authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST receivable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is included with other receivables or payables in the consolidated balance sheet.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to the taxation authority, are presented as operating cash flows.

(p) Parent entity financial information

The financial information for the parent entity, New South Wales Rugby Union Ltd, disclosed in note 25 has been prepared on the same basis as the consolidated financial statements, except as set out below.

(i) Investments in subsidiaries

Investments in subsidiaries are accounted for at cost in the financial statements of New South Wales Rugby Union Ltd. Dividends received from subsidiaries are recognised in the parent entity's profit or loss when its right to receive the dividend is established.

2 Critical estimates and judgements

The preparation of financial statements requires the use of accounting estimates which, by definition, will seldom equal the actual results. Management also needs to exercise judgement in applying the Group's accounting policies.

(a) Significant estimates and judgements

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated. They are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that may have a financial impact on the entity and that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

(b) Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

The Group makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. Management believes that there no areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements.
