



Brentford and Hanwell's Waterways

Water is at the heart of West London. There's a wealth of waterway heritage to discover in Brentford and neighbouring Hanwell as you tread the towpaths, ramble along the riverside and walk by the water.

The famous industrial engineer Isambard Kingdom Brunel put his mark on the area by creating the Grand Junction Canal, now called the Grand Union Canal. Brentford is the gateway to the Grand Union Canal that winds its way along a 137-mile course all

around and explore. Whether it's watching the boats as they make their way through this course of obstacles, or wandering down the towpath with the picturesque flight on one side and the impressive Victorian hospital and its unusual walls

While at first sight this may not strike you as a particularly fascinating feat of engineering, look a little closer and you can see how this structure is made up of a canal crossing a railway, being crossed by a road. The combination of all three of these pieces of infrastructure intersecting at one point makes this, particularly for its time, a real wonder of the waterways. It was also one of the last structures built by Brunel – one of the foremost figures of England's Industrial Revolution – and is

on the other, this is a waterway attraction not to be missed.



Thames Lock and Brentford Dock

Key canal sites

To see a piece of working waterway, head down to Thames Lock and the Dock beside it. Boats and barges travel to the boatyard to be fixed up and checked out before they continue their travels around the waterways. The large electric lock is manned by a British Waterways lock keeper whose job it is to see boats safely though the structure and on their way up the canal or out onto the Thames. You could catch a boat passing by before you set off north along the towpath to Brentford Basin.



The locks here were once used to 'gauge' the amount of cargo being carried by craft hoping to cross the country on the Grand Union Canal and the toll required to use it calculated and charged. For this the small toll house was used.

Today, the basin is a picture que hub with shops and eateries sitting alongside homes and houseboats. One of these eateries is the excellent Grounds Café, which also offers information about the waterways and what to see and do around them, alongside their array of coffee and cakes that are sure to tempt you.



3 Gallows Bridge

This iconic black and white iron footbridge is notable for its physical appeal as it gracefully curves across the navigation, as well as its impressive lineage. Attributed to the famous industrial era engineer, Thomas Telford, the structure is a delightful reminder of the waterway's working past as well as a handy crossing point. The steeply sloping sides provide an interesting challenge to the unsuspecting jogger.



Hanwell Flight of Locks

This ancient scheduled monument is the jewel in the crown of West London's waterways. The series of six locks which raises the canal by 53ft in a third of a mile makes for a fascinating landscape to look

Kew Bridge Steam Museum

It's hard to miss the impressive tower of the historic water supply building, which now houses the Kew Bridge Steam Museum. Inside you'll find a magnificent collection of steam pumping engines, which tell the incredible story of how steam power changed the world.

A short walk from Brentford Lock and Basin, this stately home of the Duke of Northumberland is an impressive estate. The beautifully landscaped grounds sweep up from the banks of the Thames to the house whose elegant façade hints at the breathtaking interiors inside. With a flourishing garden centre and café, London Tropical Zoo, children's activity centre and great conservatory among the other attractions also on this site, it's well worth a detour from the towpath.

Wizzbike

Brentford is a wonderful base for exploring the canal and the nearby River Thames by bike. You can hire bikes, or pick up spares and cycling provisions, from WiZZBiKE, close to the gauging locks in Brentford High Street. A larger facility is available from Thames Cycle Hire, under Richmond Bridge.


Wildlife around the waterway

The Hanwell Flight, and the waterway that stretches south from it, hosts some of London's best natural environments. This green corridor is a tree-lined haven for kingfishers who dive for the small fish which inhabit the underwater world. During the summer months dragonflies and damselflies emerge as gorgeous winged creatures and are an ever fascinating waterside sight.
