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

Why do we need new marine legislation?

To balance competing interests

To reconcile and integrate conservation goals with the full range of demands we place on the marine environment to meet our economic and social needs

To help meet European obligations



Northern Ireland Approach

UK Marine and Coastal Access Bill

- Marine Policy Statement,
- marine planning in the offshore part of the Northern Ireland zone
- replacement of FEPA

Northern Ireland Assembly Bill

- marine planning in territorial waters
- further streamlined licensing
- improved marine nature conservation protection
- consideration of a delivery mechanism



UK Bill - Marine Planning Framework

The creation of a UK wide marine policy statement, followed by

A series of plans at regional level



UK Bill - Marine Licensing

- Aim a more integrated licensing system for all marine activities which is more efficient and transparent, resulting in less risk, delay and cost to business
- Simplify the licensing processes within each sector
- Key reform in NI replacement of Part 2 of the Food and Environment Protection Act 1985 (FEPA)



UK Bill - Enforcement of Marine Licences

- Suite of enforcement powers
- Notices Compliance notices, Remediation notices, Stop notices
- Civil sanctions Fixed and Variable penalties
- Formal Appeals mechanism Water Appeals Commission



NI Marine Bill - Marine Planning

Provide the power to plan for territorial waters

 Set out the principles by which we intend to undertake marine planning



Marine Planning - Principles

- Comprehensive
- Informed
- Inclusive
- Flexible
- Integrated
- Statutory



NI Marine Bill - Streamlined licensing

- Simplification of sectoral regimes
 - ➤ Marine Renewables
 - Harbour Developments
 - Carbon Capture and Storage
 - ➤ Gas Storage
- Planning Reform emerging proposals



NI Marine Bill - Marine Nature Conservation

- Protection to ensure vulnerable species, habitats or geological features outside the scope of the Habitats/Birds Directives are safeguarded
- Marine Conservation Zones known as (MCZs)
- Flexibility in terms of site boundary, level of protection and timescales (i.e.seasonal)



MCZ Process

- Site Selection based on best available scientific evidence and to take account of socio/economic aspects as well as conservation objectives
- Full consultation
- Designated by Order through SOS sets out conservation objectives = level of protection



MCZ - PROTECTION MEASURES

- General offence for a person who intentionally undertakes any action which is detrimental to the habitat or feature of a MCZ
- Incurs a fine which is largely dependent on level of financial benefit which the offender has accrued in undertaking the activity (UK Bill has maximum fine of £50k)



MCZ - OTHER PROTECTION MEASURES

- Duty on public bodies to adhere to the conservation objectives of the site when undertaking (usually licensed) activities
- Bye-laws, including fixed penalties, for regulating non-licensed activities (UK Bill has fines up to £5,000 (level 5))
- Stop Notices to stop immediately potentially detrimental activity
