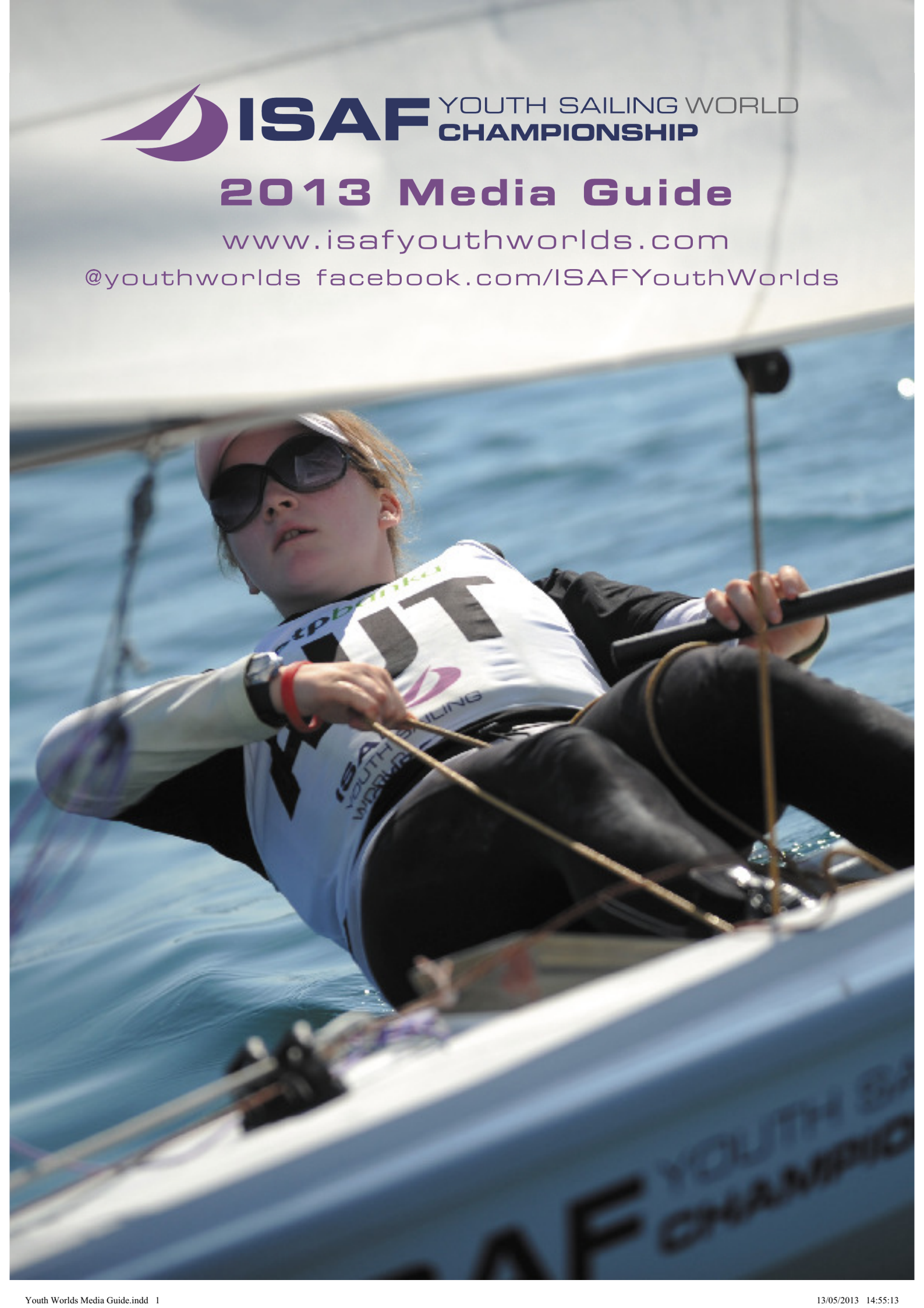

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# Introduction

The ISAF Youth Sailing World Championship was first held in Angelholm, Sweden in 1971 where 16 nations competed for the inaugural titles in the two-person dinghies, 420 and Flipper.

As the regatta evolved further classes were added to bring the best young sailing talent across the world together in one place and in 1984 the Mistral windsurfer was added to the list of events with Knut Budig (GER) taking the first gold medal in San Diego, California.

Open to sailors aged 19 and under the 43rd version of the ISAF Youth Worlds heads to Limassol, Cyprus from 13-20 July 2013 as the stars of the future are born once again.

Past notable winners include American's Cup skippers, Chris Dickson (NZL), Russell Coutts (NZL), Dean Barker (NZL); Olympic medallists, Ben Ainslie (GBR), Robert Scheidt (BRA), Alessandra Sensi (ITA), Iain Percy (GBR) and Elise Rechichi (AUS); Volvo Ocean Race sailors like Stuart Bannatyne (NZL) and Richard Clarke (CAN). The most successful ISAF Youth World Champions are Great Britain's Sally Cuthbert and Poland's Zofia Klepacka having won four successive titles in the Laser II and Mistral respectively.

Great Britain is the current holder of the Nations Trophy, awarded annually to the top performing nation at the Youth Worlds. The Nations Trophy was first introduced in 1991 and in 1999 became the Volvo Trophy until 2010. France is the most successful nation through the history of the Championship, winning the Nations Trophy on a record eleven occasions and holding a record 70 medals: 22 gold, 30 silver and 18 bronze.

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# About

Limassol, Cyprus won the right to host the 2013 ISAF Youth Worlds at the 2009 ISAF Annual Conference in Busan, Korea and was chosen ahead of Portuguese and Swedish venues. Organized by the Cyprus Sailing Federation it will be the first time the event takes place in Cyprus.

# Venue

Considered to be one of the best sailing centres in the Eastern Mediterranean, Cyprus Sports Organization Sailing Centre, located at the eastern part of Limassol, will play host to the sailors. With superb facilities and indoor storage the venue has also played host to the RS:X European Championship. On-site office space, conference rooms and amphitheatre that's fully secure will ensure smooth organization of the 2013 ISAF Youth Worlds.

# Weather

In July the temperature in Cyprus is around 33 degrees with the water in between 24-25 degrees. A north west sea breeze tends to kick in around 14:00 local time and blowing through to the evening with no tides or currents affecting racing.

## Portugal 2014

Located on the Algarve, just 30km away from Faro International Airport, Tavira is one of Portugal's oldest towns. Clube Náutico de Tavira will host the 2014 ISAF Youth Worlds having established itself in 2003. The venue boasts hosting several European Championships with a large boat park and excellent facilities that are offered to the Race Officials, sailors and visiting media. With long days of day light, an average breeze of 15 knots and 30 degrees of heat sailors will be spoilt at the 45th edition of the ISAF Youth Worlds.

## Malaysia 2015

Hosted by the Malaysian Yachting Association the 2015 ISAF Youth Worlds will head to Asia for the first time since Busan 2005. Set to be played out at the Malaysian National Sailing Centre, in Langkawi over the New Year the sailing area is within a sheltered bay with temperatures reaching 31 degrees. Sailors will be able to enjoy 15-25 knot north easterly breeze

## Oman 2016

Al Musannah Sports City, 100km north of Muscat and 60km from Muscat International Airport. The site has the infrastructure and facilities required to expand the country's existing tourism industry and the capability of hosting worldclass events on an environmentally friendly basis. Oman Sail manages all the marina facilities, offering 54 quality berths, dockside support and first class facilities including boat cleaning, assistance upon arrival, and a fuel dock. One of Oman Sail's four sailing schools (with a further three schools planned to open by 2016] operates from Al Musannah Sports City and it is the base for the National Sailing Teams.

# Nations Trophy

The Nations Trophy is awarded to the best overall nation at each ISAF Youth Sailing World Championship. It was first introduced in 1991 as the Nations Cup and has been awarded every year since, becoming one of the most prestigious prizes in youth sailing. In 1999, the Nations Cup was replaced by the Volvo Trophy which was awarded for the last time in 2010. Below you can take a look at our photo gallery of the winning nations over the history of the Volvo/Nations Trophy.

Scores towards the Nations Trophy standings are taken on a race-by-race basis from the top four performers of each nation across all competing events.

Top ten race finishes translate into points: ten points for a first, nine for a second, all the way down to one point for a tenth place finish. After each race is completed across all events, a nation takes its four best scores and combines them to come up with their overall Nations Trophy score for that race (anywhere between 0-40 points).

The scores are added up as the championship progresses with the Nations Trophy going to the nation with the highest number of points at the end of racing. With a potential 40 points up for grabs, the standings can alter rapidly from one race to another, making the battle for the Nations Trophy one of the most exciting and keenly fought contests of the championship.

# Bengt Julin Trophy

The ISAF Bengt Julin Trophy is a unique trophy which is awarded to a competitor or a National Team that has done most to foster international understanding and displaying attributes that should be encouraged in international competition at the ISAF Youth Worlds.

Sailors competing at the ISAF Youth Worlds vote for who they believe has demonstrated good sportsmanship, respect, graciousness, friendliness and endeavour.

Having been one of the founders of the World Youth Sailing Trust and a passionate ambassador for young sailors, Bengt Julin donated the trophy to the ISAF Youth Worlds in 1990.

# Athlete Participation Programme

The ISAF Athlete Participation Programme (APP) was introduced in 2002, with the aim of assisting athletes from developing sailing nations with the costs associated with attending an event.

## APP History

Since the programme began in 2002, the Athlete Participation Programme has enabled over 150 sailors to compete in the 2002 and 2006 editions of the ISAF World Sailing Games and the Volvo Youth Sailing ISAF World Championship since 2003. You can find out more on the sailors supported by the APP through the years by clicking on the links to the right.

Thanks to APP funding a total of ten new nations - including the Cook Islands, Cuba, El Salvador and Paraguay - have been able to compete at the Volvo Youth Sailing ISAF World Championship for the first time.

The future for the programme is exciting as the applicant numbers increase and there is a greater diversity from the countries which apply.

## How It Works

The Athlete Participation Programme allows athletes, via their MNA, to apply for support in a number of different ways:

### Event Coaching/Support

So those athletes which attend the event without a coach or team leader can apply for coaching support.

### Entry Fee Subsidy

Applicants can apply for help with the €670 entry fee. They can either ask for help with the whole amount or part of the cost of the entry fee.

### Travel Subsidy

To assist in covering the expenses of the athlete's travel, you may apply for a Travel Subsidy to cover either part or the entire cost of their travel. ISAF will reimburse the cost of the expenses upon receipt of the necessary travel documents.

# About ISAF

The world governing body for the sport of sailing was created in Paris in October 1907. It was initially called the International Yacht Racing Union (IYRU) before the name was changed to the International Sailing Federation (ISAF) on 5 August 1996.

The International Sailing Federation is officially recognised by the International Olympic Committee as the governing authority for sailing world-wide. As such, ISAF is responsible for promotion of the sport internationally, managing sailing at the Olympic Games, developing the International Racing Rules and Regulations for all sailing competitions and the training of judges, umpires and other administrators, the development of the sport around the world, as well as representing sailors in all matters concerning the sport.

The name change to the International Sailing Federation in 1996 came with the change to the name of the sport on the Olympic programme from Yachting to Sailing.

In order to promote the development of the sport the ISAF has established several events - including, but not limited to the ISAF World Sailing Championships and ISAF Sailing World Cup (for Olympic equipment), ISAF Youth Sailing World Championship, ISAF Team Racing World Championship, ISAF Match Racing World Championship, ISAF Women's Match Racing World Championship, ISAF Nations Cup, as well as endorsing and grading the top international match racing and Olympic Class regattas, the results of which go towards sailors' world rankings, which are administered by ISAF.

ISAF currently consists of 138 member nations who are its principle members, and responsible for the decision making process that governs the sailing world.

There are currently 114 ISAF International, Recognized and Classic Yacht Classes, ranging from the small dinghies up to the 60ft Monohulls.

ISAF, from its outset, has worked towards a primary goal to ensure that as many people as possible go sailing.

In 2007 ISAF celebrated its Centenary year by celebrating sailing. The ISAF members, sailing clubs, regatta organizers, sailors and fans were encouraged to organize activities to mark the Centenary with the 'Sail the World weekend' dedicated to getting as many people out on the water world-wide as possible. ISAF also launched the ISAF Sailing Hall of Fame in 2007 to acknowledge some of the sports greatest achievers.

ISAF has had seven elected Presidents since 1946 when Sir Ralph Gore took up the role. Current ISAF President, Carlo Croce, who was elected in November 2012, follows in the footsteps of his father Beppe, who held the role from 1969-1986.



# Glossary

Sailing Term	Definition
<b>Boom</b>	The horizontal pole or spar attached to the mast and the bottom of the sail.
<b>Bow</b>	The front of the boat.
<b>Buoy</b>	A floating marker.
<b>Capsize</b>	When a boat overturns.
<b>Centreboard</b>	An adjustable fin primarily used to stop the boat moving sideways through the water. Also called daggerboard.
<b>Course</b>	The route which the boats must sail to complete the race.
<b>Daggerboard</b>	An adjustable fin primarily used to stop the boat moving sideways through the water. Also called centreboard.
<b>Dinghy</b>	e.g. Laser, 470, Finn - the dinghies used at the Olympics - they all have a one hull and a centreboard or daggerboard.
<b>Downwind</b>	Boats sailing downwind have the wind behind them. If a boat has a spinnaker it will be used while sailing downwind.
<b>Fleet Racing</b>	Competition format where entries race against each other around a course
<b>Genoa/Head-sail/Jib</b>	The smaller sail set in front of the mast.
<b>Hiking/hike out</b>	To lean out over the side to balance the boat against the force of the wind.
<b>Jury</b>	The group of Rules experts who decide the outcome of protests.
<b>Keelboat</b>	e.g. Star, Elliott 6m- A boat with a "keel" - the fin attached to the bottom that prevents it from capsizing and stops it moving sideways through the water.
<b>Kite (asymmetric)</b>	A large, often colourful sail used during downwind sailing set in front of the other sails (carried by the 470, 49er) The 49er uses an asymmetric spinnaker.
<b>Knot</b>	A measure of wind speed 1 knot = 1 nautical mile per hour, 1.15 mph and 1.85 km/h.
<b>Leeward</b>	Side furthest away from the wind.
<b>Mainsail</b>	The sail behind the mast.
<b>Mast</b>	The vertical spar or pole to which the sail(s) are attached.
<b>Match Racing</b>	Competition format where two identical boats race against each other.
<b>Medal Race</b>	The final race in the series. Only the top 10 boats after the opening series compete and scores are doubled.
<b>Multihull</b>	e.g. Nacra 17 - A boat with more than one hull. A boat with two hulls is also known as a catamaran and a boat with three hulls is known as a trimaran
<b>Port</b>	The left hand side of a boat when looking forward. A boat is on "port tack" when the wind is coming from the left.
<b>Protest</b>	A claim that another boat has broken the Rules.

<b>Sailing Term</b>	<b>Definition</b>
<b>Race Officials</b>	The Officials responsible for running the race and enforcing the Rules.
<b>Rudder</b>	Attached to the tiller the rudder is used to steer the boat.
<b>Sheet</b>	A rope used to control a sail.
<b>Skiff</b>	e.g. 49er - A light open dinghy with a self draining hull.
<b>Slalom finish</b>	A technical section of the windsurfing (RS:X) course involving multiple changes of direction in quick succession.
<b>Spinnaker</b>	A large, often colourful sail used during downwind sailing set in front of the other sails (carried by the 470, 49er and Women's Match Racing) The 49er spinnaker is asymmetric. Also called kite.
<b>Starboard</b>	The right hand side of a boat when looking forward. A boat is on "starboard tack" when the wind is blowing from the right.
<b>Stern</b>	The back of a boat
<b>Tiller</b>	The handle attached to the rudder used to steer a boat
<b>Trapeze</b>	A wire attached to the mast to which a sailor wearing a harness attaches him/herself. It enables them to position their weight further out of the boat providing greater balance against the boat heeling over. Used on the 470 and 49er.
<b>Upwind</b>	Sailing upwind means to sail towards the direction the wind is coming from. A boat cannot sail directly into the wind so will sail a zig zag course to reach the upwind (windward) mark.
<b>Windsurfer</b>	e.g. RS:X - The board, sail, mast etc on which the sailor stands up.
<b>Windward</b>	The side closest to the wind.
