


Before launching

- Sign on
- Check course
- Check tide times
 - Where to put your boat while rigging
 - Where to leave your trolley while out sailing
 - Potential height of waves when landing
- Pull your boat onto the beach





Where to put your boat for launching

Launching

- HELP OTHERS !!!!!!
 - Single-handers especially need help
 - WARNING: Never get caught between a boat and the shore
- Watch the 'experts'
 - Which techniques work
 - Which don't !
- Be willing to ask

Launching in waves

- Ask for help
- Wait for a gap in the waves
 - Learn to 'read' the sea
 - Be patient
 - Start to launch just before the gap arrives
- Once committed don't stop !!!!!!

Launching in waves (2)

- Jump in and go
 - The waves are most powerful when they are breaking
 - The centreboard can wait until later
 - Get a helper to push down the rudder when pushing you out
 - Keep the boat flat
- When out beyond the breaking waves stop the boat
 - Put down centreboard and the rudder

Launching in onshore winds

- Crewed boats
 - Crew gets in first and puts centreboard in
- Single-handed boats
 - You need help
 - Get on board, put in centreboard
- A BIG push is needed to give some initial speed
- Steer into the waves and then bear away for speed



- Be on the line at the start
- Keep to the centre of the course on the beats
 - Keep close to the leaders
- Don't over-stand marks
 - Beware of the tide
- Sail a straight line down the reaches
 - Beware of the tide

Landing in waves

- Be prepared
 - Tidy sheets etc. so you don't get tangled
 - Release the rudder hold-down
 - Have a plan
 - Inform your crew of the plan

Landing in waves (2)

- Try to land in the middle of the beach
 Groynes are hard and limit your choices
- Pick a small wave if possible
 - Approach from slightly down-wind: you are then in control
- Remove the centreboard in good time
 - Not as you are about to hit the beach
 - You will wobble as the last bit is removed
 - Steering will change with no centerboard

Landing in waves (3)

- Keep the boat at right-angles to the waves
 - The rudder will be raised and have limited steering control
 - Keep it flat
 - Lean the boat slightly to steer

Landing in waves (4)

- Land on the back of a wave
 - Try not to surf down the front of a wave just as it breaks
 - Keep the bow UP
 - Controlled speed is the key
- Don't stop just where the waves are breaking
- Quickly get the boat clear of the water

Landing in waves (5)

- If it all goes wrong
 - Try and capsize with the mast pointing out to sea
 - Bail out
 - the boat will probably do better without you
 - Keep the tip of the mast up in the air




Landing in waves and strong on-shore winds

- Approach from one side and then just point at the shore at the last minute
 - More control over speed
 - More stable
 - Can pick a wave

Landing in waves and strong on-shore winds (2)

- Consider taking down the mainsail if you have a jib
 - More control BUT less speed
 - Easier to handle once ashore
- Start well upwind
- Practice in lighter winds



Landing in waves and light winds

- No speed means no control
 - You are at the mercy of whatever wave comes along
- Consider jumping in the water and holding the transom
 - Reduced weight in the boat
 - Keeps the boat straight

Landing in off-shore winds

- Reach along the shore and then head up at the last minute
- Keep the centreboard in until as long as possible



- Take down your sails
- Move your boat away from the water's edge if it's busy

- Help pull other boats up the beach
- Operate the winch not juniors please
