VVelcome to our Spring / Summer 2014 edition of the Bembridge Breeze.

This is our third summer season and steadily our Harbour improvements have added value to our berthing offering. We continually strive to improve our facilities for both our local residents and also our visitors.

As many of you will be aware, I have been critical of the on-shore facilities we inherited on purchase - there is only so far you can go in refurbishing and bettering our showers and toilets. Sadly we have reached that point.

Hence I am pleased to announce that we have submitted a planning application to build new offices that will include shower and toilet facilities at our Visitors' pontoon at The Duver, and also a new shower and toilet block for our Bembridge Marina.

As part of this exciting initiative, and to enable us to fund the new facilities and future proof costs going forwards, we have also included a small number of houses.

All the houses will have spectacular views – most will overlook the Harbour; some will also have views across the Downs and some

will also have views across to the mainland. To be able to construct waterside homes is very unusual and unique – we are taking great care in their design, location and the facilities they offer.

Also included is a small cluster of business units – I am very keen to encourage businesses to Bembridge and believe that we can provide a focal point that will hopefully be allied with marine skills.

We have plans for a "Family Fun Weekend" on 25th - 27th July following last year's successful event. We are delighted that in addition to several Island charities benefitting from individual events, we will also be supporting Hampshire and Isle of Wight Air Ambulance which provides a vital service to the Island's community. Return acts over the weekend include Bembridge Sailing Club's Bembridge Village Regatta, Brading Haven Yacht Club's Great Bembridge Paper Boat Race, paddleboard/kayak events, beach activities and competitions and Dance on the Duver, which will once again finish with a fireworks display – we hope you will be able to join us!



Wildlife Adventures around Bembridge Harbour



Summer is a great time to get out and about and explore all the wonderful wildlife to be found around Bembridge Harbour. Here are as few suggestions of places to visit within easy walking distance.





St Helen's Duver is a low-lying sandy spit of short turf and gently undulating ground managed by the National Trust. In 1882, the Royal Isle of Wight Golf Club was established on this spot, one of the very first golf courses in England. The club closed in 1961/2 and little evidence of this remains today apart from the clumps of gorse scrub, which would have presented natural obstacles to playing golf, and the club house, which is now a National Trust holiday cottage.

However, the Duver is renowned today for its rich flora during the summer months. It is the only example of fixed sand dune habitat on the Island and, for its size, has the richest flora of any site on the Island. Conditions for plants are extreme. The freely drained sandy soil is poor in nutrients and dries out quickly meaning that there is a shortage of water and nutrients for plants during the growing season. Additionally, in recent years flooding from the sea has become a regular event during the winter months. Plants have adapted to these extreme growing conditions. Many of them germinate in the autumn, grow overwinter during mild spells and flower in spring and early summer before becoming desiccated by the heat and drought. These are all small plants and you need to get onto your hands and knees to admire them but, if you are prepared to do so, you will find a host of different clovers, chickweeds and sand dune grasses and bushy Cladonia lichens, many of them being uncommon. Sea Bindweed has more showy flowers during the summer months. It has large trumpet flowers, candy striped in pink and white and held at ground level. .

Best known of the special plants of the Duver is Autumn Squill, a rare relative of the bluebell. This plant survives the adverse condition by having a bulb, buried deep in the sand. During August and September it sends up heads of purplish-lilac flowers. In some years you can find them in abundance on the Duver. Later on, they produce a rosette of narrow leaves which die back in the spring. The stronghold of this plant is on rocky coastal headlands in Devon and Cornwall and this is one of very few sites away from there.

Apart from plants, a range of specialised insects can be found on the Duver. These include digger wasps that dig tunnels into low sandy banks to lay their eggs and spectacular Wasp Spiders which appear in the autumn in some years. The females are large and have black and yellow stripes, but are quite harmless. These spiders have colonised from the Continent and are gradually spreading northwards in response to our changing climate.

Rock pool adventures

On a falling tide, you can follow the beach around eastwards to Forelands or northwards into Priory Bay. At low tide, rocky shores are exposed at St Helen's Ledges and Bembridge Ledges. These are platforms of hard Bembridge limestone ridges with softer pockets amongst them giving rise to abundant rock pools and lagoons at low tide. Together, they provide the best examples of rocky shores on the south coast, east of Poole Harbour. They are great places to look for sea life. There are a host of different seaweeds in reds, browns and greens, many with intricate, delicate patterns. You can find a range of crabs, small fishes, worms and shellfish trapped in the pools. Just make sure that you keep a wary eye open for the incoming tide!

Take the Water Taxi over to Bembridge Point

This is the sandy headland which protects the harbour from on-shore winds. The Point is covered with spiky bushes of Sea Buckthorn which screen the car park and Bennett's aggregate yard. Sea Buckthorn bears clusters of golden orange berries in late summer, rich in vitamin C and a popular source of food for thrushes and other birds. We know that Sea Buckthorn was first planted on the dunes at the entrance to Bembridge Harbour in 1858 by the Victorian naturalist Alexander Goodman More, who lived in Vectis Lodge in Kings Road.

The sand dunes hold plants which need free draining coastal locations to thrive. Look for the big tufts of Marram Grass which stabilise the sand and help to bind it together. There are usually lots of Fragrant-Evening Primrose plants growing amongst them. They are upright plants with yellow flowers which open fully in the evening to attract moths and other pollinators. When they go over, the petals turn a fiery orange unlike other much commoner types of evening-primrose. This plant grows in the wild in Chile. It is another of the plants introduced by A G More. He first sowed it on St Helen's Duver but, by 1894 it had found its way naturally across onto Bembridge Point.

Look for the strangely named Duke of Argyll's Tea Tree, a low bush with tubular purple flowers, growing behind the Tollgate Café. It was first introduced into this country in the 1730s as a hedging plant for coastal localities. The orange-red fruits are known today as goji berries and are eaten because of the high levels of anti-oxidants and vitamin C which they contain.

Also to be found here are bushes of Tree Lupins with lemon yellow spikes of flowers from early June onwards. Yet again, these were introduced, but only within the last sixty years. They thrive on sandy soils because their roots have swellings or nodules containing special bacteria which can fix the nitrogen in the air into nitrates which the plant can use for growth and which would otherwise be scarce in well drained sandy soils.

In some years there are plenty of bushes of Tree Lupins and in other years there are very few. This is because the soft stems are attacked by a particularly large blue-green aphid which is specific to lupins and can be present in sufficient numbers to kill the plant.

A flowery meadow

If you're heading into Bembridge village, take some time to explore the cemetery behind St Luke's chapel along Lane End. The cemetery was constructed in the 1880s on one of the small flower-rich meadows which were once frequent around Bembridge. Although the cemetery no longer looks quite like a meadow, the wild flowers survive. The habitat is described as unimproved neutral grassland and you can find such plants as Corky-fruited Water Dropwort, Squirrel-tail Fescue grass, Oxeye Daisy, Meadow Vetchling and Salad Burnet. In some years, you can also find the purple flowering spikes of Yarrow Broomrape, which is quite a rarity. Look out also for a range of butterflies, bees and other insects attracted to the flowers as a source of nectar.
