- (14) VENUE GOOD & BAD POINTS?
- (a) ASHORE: A true sailing town! Great pubs, clubs and plenty to do. A good place to bring family for the week. The Cowes Corinthian Yacht Club is very comfortable and welcoming for visitors. This is clearly a no nonsense sailing club.
- (b) AFLOAT: Conditions were excellent for the Solent lots of wind and choppy waves. Committee did a great job getting races off quickly and without issue.

Please state any recommendations for future World Championship events

- a) at the same venue: Make sure you have a regatta at this venue! Travel to Cowes is challenging, so be sure to give lots of logistical information about ferry schedules, etc. There are few hotels, so housing needs to be communicated but no issue as the town lives to host sailing events. September sailing on the Solent is not for every fleet it is windy and wet but is worth it.
- b) generally in terms class logistic of running a worlds? (not venue specific points) Spend as much time as possible on the PR and

communication aspects of the regatta. By getting good video out on the website during the regatta the entire Class can be a part of the event, and hopefully with they were there.

Also, the Race Committee published the rounding order and time spreads of each boat at each mark for every race. This was information the competitors really enjoyed, getting a good quantifiable record of the impact of decisions made each leg. Lots of work for the Committee, but worth it.
