David Darbyshire



David has served the RYA tirelessly for a number of years, much of it at the highest level. During this period he has unstintingly given his time, his sound advice and his

his best for the Association

He led the volunteer effort in relation to the passage of the Marine and Coastal Access Bill which received Royal Assent in 2009. His drive, determination and scrupulous attention to detail have undoubtedly improved the standing of the RYA within the wider recreational boating community.

David was appointed as a member of the RYA Cruising Committee in 2004 and served on it until 2006 when it merged with the Legal and Government Affairs Committee (CGAC). He was then elected as Chair of the new CGAC. As its first chairman, David was pivotal in merging the various workstreams of the two committees to represent the RYA's recreational boating interests more effectively and to maximise its lobbying activity.

David served as CGAG Chairman for five years, retiring in January 2012 at the end of his tenure. He also sat as chair of the RYA Audit Committee until November 2012, when he decided it was time for him to retire from RYA duties and devote his time to family, personal study and to his passion for sailing.

Pat was involved with RYA Sailbility from 2002 when she served on the board of Trustees until 2012. She became Chair of the board in 2007.

Nick Harrison made his name as a sailor competing in the Laser class and has won the Laser Masters Worlds. European and National Championships, in addition to the Albacore World and National Championships.

As a long-standing member of Stokes Bay Sailing Club, Nick has guietly supported the Olympic campaigns of many recent GBR sailing medallists, in addition to taking an active role in the development of youth sailing at Stokes Bay. Nick can be found every weekend co-ordinating and supporting the sailing sessions, which have introduced hundreds of children to the sport of sail racing.

Since the early 1990's Nick has supported lain Percy and funded his sail development programme for 2000. He handed over the day-to-day running of his business in order to focus fully on helping lain Percy and Andrew Simpson with their 2012 Olympic campaign, all in a voluntary capacity.

As a sailing nation, it is the likes of Nick who can help make the difference. From inspiration to support and guidance, Team GBR and sailing around the UK have benefitted from Nick's help in one way or another, for over 30 years.

In the words of Andrew and Iain themselves 'Nick has an infectious enthusiasm for sailing and the support he has offered us goes much further than just coaching. He bought us a container to store our equipment in and the overall contribution he has made to us goes way beyond what we could have wished for. He is a legend.'

Colin Jenkins



During the 1990's whilst acting as results manager at Mumbles Yacht Club, Colin quickly recognised the limitations of the then computer results programmes, and set about improving them.

It soon became apparent to him that nothing short of a new system would suffice. He went on to develop and distribute the results programme 'Sailwave' as freeware available to all without charge and in doing so brought national and international benefit to the sailing community.

An important feature of Sailwave, is the users forum which provides feedback and influences the ongoing development of the software. This group is now worldwide in its spread and boasts over 2000 members.

Colin has also made a direct, personal contribution to RYA events and technical administration. He has been instrumental in helping the RYA develop its Portsmouth Yardstick Scheme over the past six years, making major modifications to Sailwave to help the RYA collect and collate race results and has more recently made additional modifications to support the National Handicap for Cruisers.

Colin's work has always been in a voluntary capacity, and his drive and enthusiasm to help the sport of sailing and the RYA have been greatly appreciated.



Martin Broom, MBE



Sadly, Martin passed away last month.

Martin was a great sailor who, in his late seventies was still racing competitively and still winning.

However, Martin will

be remembered in Broads history as a tireless worker and his record for contributing to the administration and well-being of boating is without equal.

His greatest contribution has been as a member of the Broads Authority and as Chair of its Navigation Committee from 1988 to 2011. He was first appointed to the body when it was in its infancy and he helped steer it through the difficult negotiations which led to the first Broads Act in 1988. He has also been the RYA representative on the various bodies controlling the port of Great Yarmouth.

Martin's achievements are all the more remarkable given that he undertook these roles at a time when he was also Chairman and CEO of Broom Boats and at one point Chairman of the National Boat Show.

Martin was a wise, unassuming, committed and long term contributor to the well-being of the Norfolk and Suffolk Broads.

One of the many highlights of his tenure was the club presentation of the Lipton Trophy in New Zealand during the Americas Cup; an event he was pivotal in planning and leading.

In October 2004, shortly after his retirement from a successful career in banking, Oliver was elected Honorary Treasurer and a Director of RYA Northern Ireland. He brought his professional knowledge and experience to set in place robust financial procedures and audit arrangements.

Oliver's professional knowledge, skills, understanding of the running of sailing clubs, active interest in sailing, commitment to the task in hand, and last but not least, his good people skills have all been important factors in his successful and significant contribution to RYA Northern Ireland as Honorary Treasurer and Director.

David is an immensely influential individual in the North East region, where he has served for many years. He is currently Regional Treasurer, having stepped down after a five year stint as Chairman in 2012, which was preceded

by five years as Vice Chair, and a previous two terms on the committee.

Since 1966, David has been a mainstay in the organisational running and management of the North East Cruiser Racing Association (NECRA) and is the current Chairman. Along with other clubs, David has developed a measurement rule that is not only used by all the clubs in the North East but has been adopted elsewhere too.

David has been a long serving and important figure in the development of Sunderland Yacht Club. Over the past 37 years he has chaired the sailing committee on numerous occasions, served as Rear and Vice Commodore and also held the post of Commodore during the redevelopment and relocation of the club to new premises.

He remains a current member of both the sailing committee and general committee. He is a great ambassador for sailing in the North East.

The Francis Elkin Award

The Francis Elkin Award is given each year to an individual who has made a significant contribution in time, effort and personal endeavour in enabling people with disabilities to become involved in sailing.

William Smith

William (Bill) has given a lifetime of dedication to encouraging both youngsters and adults to take up sailing. He is a pioneer in the development of facilities for disabled people and a leader in taking blind and visually impaired people out on the water.

Bill, together with Michael Spear started the East Coast Blind Cruise in 1993, and in 1997 founded the East Anglian Sailing Trust (EAST) along with Kevin Curtis. Bill remains an active Trustee of EAST, and has been responsible for developing the charity from its early days with one keelboat, to its current level of activity with 12 keelboats, ten or more RYA qualified instructors and over 350 members. EAST is recognised as the Sailability Centre of Excellence for the Eastern region, an RYA training centre and is part of the RYA OnBoard programme.

A notable achievement has been Bill's ability to raise over £250,000 from a long list of donors and sponsors to enable these developments to take place. Quite simply, without Bill's input, leadership and continuing involvement, EAST would not exist.

His infectious enthusiasm makes it hard to say no, especially when he quietly sidles up to you at the club bar or an event, and he says 'Hello old chap, wonder if you could just...' You always say yes.

Francis Elkin was a former Chair of RYA Council and a Trustee of Sailability from its inception in 1995 until he passed away in 2001. He worked tirelessly for Sailability and committed his time and energy to ensuring the charity was successful. The Francis Elkin Award was created in his memory.

Etchells UK Class Association



Joining the Etchells Association's General Committee in 2008 when the UK fleet was at the point of cancelling events, due to a lack of numbers. David stepped in, instigating a campaign

to drive the fleet back to full strength. Today, he has transformed the Etchells racing fleet, not only reenergising the traditional sailors but introducing a complete new generation of young sailors to the class.

In 2011, David initiated the idea of having fully funded keelboats available for under 24 year-olds to skipper and race. He single-handedly pulled together the funding to launch the Etchells RYA Youth trials in 2012 which saw two fully funded boats being made available to two youth teams for the 2012 and 2013 seasons, one of which went on to be 2nd in the British Etchells Championship.

The positive reaction from the young sailors to the class and the racing has been a big part in bringing a new vibrancy to the class in general. David has also been a key driver within the class securing the 2016 World Championships which will be hosted in Weymouth, Dorset.

On a personal level David regularly has a bevy of young sailors on his IRC boat racing competitively in the Solent, hosts an 'open house' or provides accommodation for young sailors.

Rex Hawkins

The Gwennili Trust



The Gwennili Trust was founded to provide yacht sailing opportunities for people with disabilities. Over the years, people of all ages with a wide range of disabilities whether visually impaired, with learning

difficulties or of limited mobility, have enjoyed the thrill of sailing, largely due to the dedication and commitment of Rex.

In his role as Operations Manager for the Trust he has devoted his time; negotiating, implementing and supervising the annual sailing programme for each busy season.

Since 2005, Rex's commitment has greatly widened the Trust's contacts with a significant number of organisations and institutions. His personal devotion to this has entailed many face-to-face meetings, visits and a huge number of emails and telephone calls, resulting in 595 days at sea. This has provided offshore sailing for 2,713 disabled people of whom 409 were wheelchair dependent and training which led to RYA qualifications for 11 Day Skippers and 23 Competent Crew.

Rex himself has been a Mate on many occasions and gained a great understanding of the complex needs of the sailors who charter the boats. In 2008 he skippered his own yacht for Blind Week, hosted by the Royal Cornwall Yacht Club, inspiring the students taking part and passing on his knowledge and experience as a sailor himself.

David Musgrove

Disabled Sailing Association



David founded the Disabled Sailing Association in 2005 with a group of people with disabilities who wanted to share the thrill and freedom of seagoing sailing. Initially David financed the charity

himself but in his role as Chairman he has worked tirelessly to raise awareness and funds for the Association. In November 2007. David's efforts secured lottery funding and the charity was able to buy its third yacht, a new 35ft yacht 'Freedom', adapted for wheelchair users. She was taken across the channel to St Malo and the Channel Islands in 2010, allowing disabled sailors to experience offshore passages and life onboard.

David, who is himself visually impaired, is also heavily involved in the assessment of volunteers and if not able to do it personally, coordinates their specialised training. His control of the sailing schedule and crew rotas ensure that all get an equal opportunity of crewing the boats in the fleet.

David's leadership skills have cemented invaluable relationships with local yacht clubs and harbour masters and he has forged strong friendships with all volunteers to whom he makes himself available 24/7. From just a handful of disabled people in the early days, David's efforts and perseverance have now had a positive impact providing sailing enjoyment to hundreds of people each year.

Martin Payne

Sutton-in-Ashfield Sailing Club



Martin has been a stalwart of Sutton-in-Ashfield Sailing Club for a number of years, heading up the sailing committee and as Commodore for three successive years from 2008-11. During this

time it was evident that for the club's survival it had to attract new members. Martin took on this task and his commitment to the club has seen membership steadily increase since.

By kick-starting a junior section 'kids' club' Martin introduced sailing on Wednesday evenings and Sunday mornings during the summer. Working closely with the RYA, the club was awarded OnBoard recognition in 2012 and by liaising with local schools, Sea Scouts, Sea Cadets and other groups, membership has continued to grow. Now even parents are taking up sailing.

Open sailing events and regattas, together with personal handicaps and the time-keeping software Martin has introduced, has ensured that competition is keen in the new gold and silver race fleets.

But it is not just out on the water that Martin has made a difference to the club; onshore his commitment has brought about a total revamp of the club's changing rooms and the club now boasts a new hardstanding and car park and Martin continues to turn his hand to any job that needs to be done.

Russell joined Pilkington Sailing Club, at the age 12, immediately becoming a prominent junior member of the club: participating in a wide range of activities he serves as a positive


example to all other junior members.
