

The aim is to help improve your boat handling skills so that whatever discipline of sailing you choose, cruising or racing, you have more confidence to take part. BRINGING UP THE REAR

Well I thought that by scheduling the boat park reorganising in March we would expect some warmer weather. So considering we have had the coldest March for about fifty years I can only say a big thank you to the hardy souls that turned up. It was in the balance on Saturday 23rd as to whether we were going to continue, with the temperature hovering above zero and sleet being driven horizontal by a bitter easterly! Luckily the sleet stopped mid-morning and the thermometer rose a degree or two.

Overall we had a productive two weekends with in excess of 100 boat tie-downs put in place, a big tidy up around the green and beach, and repositioning of concrete sleepers in the car park. We also had a 20 ton load of road plainings laid on the first part of our road. I am sure you will agree that it all looks organised and tidy.

One of the aims was to organise the boats into classes, which to a large extent has been achieved and we hope that this will get sailors with same type to talk and encourage each other on to the water more often. There may be a need from time to time to move boats to maintain this. We did dispose of a lot of rubbish and in particular old bits of timber used for running boards which were looking particularly shabby. I know it can be difficult to pull the trolleys out of the beach so I would like to see the use of some cheap paving slabs or similar to put under wheels. These will not degrade as quick and will help to maintain the tidiness. There are some concrete blocks available for anyone who wishes to put some extra tie downs.

We are now in a position to allocate tie downs to each boat and record this on a chart; this should allow easy identification of each boat. We will check at the end of April that all boats have a valid boat sticker for the current year. The intention is that any boat not displaying a valid sticker will be moved to a holding area at the back of green. See also Chris' article for instructions on this and on the road/launching trolleys).

The new handrail for the balcony is now in place (well done Gary & co) with just the new chain link to fix and weatherproofing of the new decking in front of race office. After a delay with some technical issues, the new roller shutter doors to the boat house have been ordered and should be in place by end of month.

Once again thanks to all who have contributed during the closed season and let's hope we have some decent weather for sailing. I look forward to seeing you on the water.

SAILING SCHOOL

I was offered the chance to take our new RIB out last weekend (30th March). With a few other stalwart members, we did some ad hoc power boat training whilst also supporting the new RIB being run in. We took both Tornados to support each other as the new RIB requires 20 hours use before we can use it as a safety boat. To say it was cold was an understatement, but we did have a chance to blow away the cobwebs and get our 'eye' back into boat driving with some high speed handling, Man Overboard and Mark collecting. I always akin RIB driving to riding a motorcycle, great fun when it all goes right, but deadly when it all goes wrong. The difference is that you need a DVLA licence to drive a motorcycle, you don't for a power boat, and that's where it can go wrong without the right training.

You may just have time to book into the Power Boat Racing course advertised last month (see the repeat ad below). But if by the time you read this, the planned power boat course has finished, do register your interest. If we have enough people wishing to undertake this, we can look into fitting another course into the year. Although not planned yet, I do aim to try and fit a Safety Boat course in at some point into our hectic calendar.

We still have space on the **Tuesday evening RYA Dinghy Level1 & 2 course**, if you know anyone or have family thinking of undertaking sailing as a hobby, then please pass on our details. Refer them to our new website for info www.pbsc.eu

I have already had questions on using the club boats for this year, but basically if the sailing school is running, then the boats are free to use, but please ask the duty instructor for permission in case the boat you want to use is earmarked for training. On Sundays the club boats can be rented, details on the clubhouse noticeboards and ask a Committee member before using. For the cadets, if they sign up and participate in a Sunday race, then they can use the Toppers for free.

CADETS CORNER

Well I seem somehow to have taken on the job of cadet coordinator, not quite sure how that happened!

So firstly I need to remind you that **Cadets is set to start on Saturday 5th May 2013** weather permitting! We run three groups Dolphins, Seals and Sharks. Typically Dolphins are for youngsters aged 8- 13 who have some experience of sailing. Seals is aimed at under 8 years and novice sailors. **Dolphins runs from 10.00 to 11.00am and Seals 11.00am to 12.00pm. Sharks takes place in the afternoons (starting at 2pm)** and is aimed at older and more experienced youngster. This session will be run by instructors and race coaches and provides a variety of sailing experiences including race training and cruising.

I have looked back at the information on last year's Cadets and note that, despite the poor weather, in total we had in the region of 50 Cadets attend these sessions albeit not all at the same time. However it is worth noting that we have a limited number of boats and so **spaces for each** session is based on a first come, first serve basis. I would suggest you arrive at the club 30 minutes before the session is due to start, this gives time to register for the session, be allocated a boat, rig the boat and get changed.

Can I remind parents that we cannot run these session without your help. We need parents to help rig and de-rig boats before and after sessions and get the boats up and down the beach. This leaves the instructors free to organise the teaching session and get the rescue boats ready. This year as cadets register for the session we will allocate them a number which relates to a boat, this will be the boat that the cadet will be allocated to sail that day and it will be the cadet and their parent or carer's responsibility to get it ready to sail and bring it up the beach and de-rig at the end of the session. (Of course there is always help available for any novice families). Additionally it is worth sailing parents bringing their sailing kit with them as help on the water for launching and retrieving boats is often needed.

I heard on the radio today the weather for May and June is going to be sunny with above average temperatures, so my fingers are firmly crossed for a steady force 3 and look forward to seeing you all down the club.
