We'll we've visited the dinghy show, been trained on the Rules of Racing, serviced our safety boats, hosted 140 Lasers, held our warm up races and are now ready for the glorious sunny Pevensey Bay season that surely lies ahead.

The RYA Dinghy Show saw 14 or so members informally congregate at the bar at lunchtime on the first Saturday of the show at Alexandra Palace – with all their bits of string, gloves boots and in once case a spinnaker. The show brings together pretty well every class of dinghy, has a number of useful technical workshops (sail trimming) and well known speakers – including Steve Cockerill: Laser, Blaze, Graduate etc National Champion and owner of Rooster Sailing.

A few days later we were honoured to have Chris Atkins, ISAF Board member, training and quizzing 50 members and guests from PBSC, Bexhill SC and Eastbourne Sovereign SC at the beginning of March on the Rules of Racing. No excuses now!

The hosting of 140 Lasers at our club on the 15/16 March was a site to behold. Travellers came from all over the British Isles with notable contingents from Ireland and Scotland. This event orchestrated by the UK Laser Association was one of a series to qualify for the Laser European and World Championships and attracted some of the best sailors in the UK including members of the RYA Development Squad who are contending for 2016 Olympic Places. Amongst the fleet were four PBSC sailors: Lewis Humphries, Jim Fifield, Greg Fowler and Neil Peters. With a pleasant offshore F2-3 complemented by wall to wall

sunshine, the conditions showed Pevensey off at its best. Special thanks to all those many PBSC members who helped make this the success it was, particularly Peter and Margaret White (Committee Boat), Gordon Bishop — Safety Boat coordination, Gary Pearson Beachmaster, Ray Ridley and Chris Clarke for their endless preparation of the club facilities and safety boats. Our good neighbour sailing clubs at Eastbourne sent two boats each in support of the event and we'll reciprocate with their opens later in the year. We are helping out Eastbourne at their RS Open with some safety ribs on the Saturday and Sunday 10/11 May - if you able to help out as helm (need a decent level of experience) or crew do please drop me an email.



The new calendar has been published for a month or so. In terms of racing on Saturdays there'll be a single Saturday Evening race from May to July and a number of training races dubbed 'Freshmans Series' from June to July on Saturday afternoons. Following feedback received from the Sunday Race survey we've now amended the racing format slightly. On Sunday the racing now starts at 10.30 hrs prompt. We are generally scheduling the first race in the morning to last c1hr, to be followed by two shorter 45 minute races in the afternoon starting at 13.30. The spring series will be a single series and will have three races per Sunday. The general aim of the sailing committee has been to achieve an earlier start, lunch and afternoon getaway. OOD and safety boat crews need to arrive at 9am, please and should be launched by 9.45am. As always anyone is welcome to sail in any race. If you are new to racing just tag on to the back of the fleet in whatever dinghy you have, you'll soon find you are hooked!

Duties for the forthcoming month will appear in Aquila – see appendix A (below) and will be pinned on the main notice board. The prime source of this information will be the Duty Check section on the website and you'll also receive emails when a duty is allocated and 14 and 5 days before hand. Please confirm your duties on Dutyman (a couple of intuitive clicks once logged in) so we know that you can make the dates. Where duties are not confirmed on Dutyman by you we'll aim to give you a phone call to confirm as day or so before hand. If you can't make the date allocated please request a swap on Dutyman with someone please doing the same role. This year, duties will be looked after by myself and Nicky Key as Duty Co-ordinator.

National Squad 2013-14. Land day & 1st camp From Lewis Humphries

Day 1 Introduction

We arrived at Weymouth College at 9:00 and joined the queue with the Topper, Laser 4.7, Optimist and Bic Techno which was poorly organised and took around 30 minutes to get through. After the main briefing we were split into groups and sent to do fitness testing which tested a variety of different muscle groups and we finished with a bleep test*. In the afternoon we were told what we should be doing to keep our mental and physical fitness up, how to plan our week and what we should be thinking about before, during and after big events. We finally left for our accommodation at PGL** at 4:30 while our parents dropped our boats off at Weymouth and Portland National Sailing Academy (WPNSA) and then went home. They aren't allowed to stay with us because we need to learn to become independent. We were told that we had to stay at PGL due to the fact that the 2.4 fleet (Will Street) had priority on the RYA house with luxury beds, TVs and decent food, which they didn't stay in anyway because they were too scared and went home!

Day 2

We barely slept during the night because the branches on the tree outside were slapping on the window and the door was rattling because of the 60 knot gusts. There was a cooked breakfast but our coach told us we are on a sportsman's diet so we weren't allowed bacon, sausage, French toast or fried mushrooms, so just beans and egg. (Another thing that would have been better if we had stayed at the RYA house. Thanks Will). We shared a coach

with the Optimists to WPNSA. They are the most annoying group of sailors with their high pitched voices and bad jokes. When we arrived we were crammed into our training room and told we weren't going sailing because of the wind and spent the rest of the day in the tiny room taking notes and doing the mental side of sailing for 6-7 hours with a few breaks. We then got back on the coach with the big headed Optimist sailors and returned to PGL. The dinner was just as bad as the breakfast so we filled ourselves up on toast. We then finished the day with some team building activities.

Day 3

We had even less sleep than yesterday due to the 85 knot gusts and someone's phone alarm going off at 4:00. The breakfast was the same as yesterday so we smuggled some sausages past our coach and were so proud until we realised they were veggie sausages so we threw them in the bin and had beans and eggs again. The Oppie sailors were mad after we chucked them off the back seats so we explained to them that Toppers take priority because they are better. The wind was gusting 100 miles an hour at times so sailing was called off again and we did more classroom work until our coach sent us up to Chesil Beach for a break.... I think the picture explains it well enough..... When we returned to PGL we discovered that the doggy door had flung open at some point in the day and the rain had soaked our bedding and notes that we had spent ages writing the day before (again thanks Will). Dinner was decent today; it was spaghetti soup with a bagel. After, our coach decided to do the marshmallow and spagnetti challenge but he didn't have any marshmallows so we used Jellybabies instead. Our team failed miserably on the first go but came joint 1st the second attempt.



Day 4

The wind had dropped to 25 knots overnight so our coach planned a 10:00 launch, which was fairly early bearing in mind that nobody had rigged their

boats and we didn't leave PGL until about 8:30. Because our coach had never seen us sail before and we had never seen each other sail he decided to start the day with 3 races, then some games, then finish on another race. I got progressively worse throughout the day, getting a 2nd and a 4th out of 25 in the first 2 despite leading each of them at some point, then in the last 2 I managed to drop from top 5 to about 10th. When we came in most of the parents had already arrived. I managed to get my mum to de-rig my boat while I got changed. We had our de-brief and were given our squad clothing and finally sent home.
