Incident Recall

- How many Yellow cars did you pass on your journey to Wyboston?
- Our senses, receive many times the amount of information than we can record
- Our brains only record what it thinks is important at the time.
- Unfortunately, our brains also distort the record to fit previous experience.





Incident Recall

- When we are racing, our brains process a huge amount of information.
- Any that is not needed in the future is discarded almost immediately – for instance the position of other boats that will not affect us.
- When an incident occurs, our brains search for the pictures.
- Those it cannot find, it makes up, to fit other things it knows.





Umpiring is largely about avoiding this

- We cannot afford to wait for an incident and then try to recall what happened and then make a decision.
- This will be very unreliable and take too long.
- The chances of two umpires agreeing (let alone the competitors) is not very high.
- We have to prepare to observe and we must have a process.





Part 2 Decisions

- Disputes arising from a Part 2 incident may be divided into two categories
 - Disputes about the facts
 - Application of the rules
- Umpires constantly agree the facts and apply the rules, so they do not have a dispute between them.






Part 2 Decisions

- Fortunately, the vast majority of decisions come down to one or two facts.
- It we anticipate what those facts will be, then we can really focus to make sure we see them properly.






Decision Making Process

Umpire Conversation Options


By communicating at the Decision Stage of the process

- Make prompt decisions
- Make better decisions
- Available for next incident
