Alternative pathway to MCA Superyacht qualifications

ver recent years there has been a growing trend for crew to start their working lives at sea on 60 to 70 metre vessels (or even larger). As a result we have seen more and more crew presenting themselves for the RYA/MCA Yachtmaster™ Offshore exam without sufficient meaningful command experience or mileage to ensure they are ready to pass it. Often this results in an exam fail, not only

costing the candidate time and money but also causing a great deal of angst.

To cater for the changing entry point to the superyacht industry we have worked with the MCA and the Yacht Qualification Panel to create an alternative pathway for crew wishing to progress to MCA Deck Officer qualifications.

Full details for the new pathway will be available on the RYA website early in the New Year and at the instructor conference. In essence it will mean that candidates will be able to take an RYA Yachtmaster™/Coastal Skipper shorebased course, an RYA Coastal Skipper practical course and a Yachtmaster™ prep week. Those, combined with their superyacht and tender operations experience will provide the necessary pre-requisite experience to sit the RYA/MCA Yachtmaster™ Coastal exam. The MCA will then accept this towards non—

command MCA Officer of the Watch qualifications.

The existing pathway to the RYA/MCA Yachtmaster™ Offshore exam will remain for those holding the pre-requisite sea time and experience on appropriate vessels, and is indeed still seen as the preferred route. However, this alternative pathway will allow progression for those who do not have adequate command experience in smaller vessels.

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The rise and rise of eLearning

since the birth of the online CEVNI test in 2010 with just a handful of students, RYA eLearning has grown beyond all recognition.

The RYA Interactive site now:

- » hosts over 325 training centres and offers six public-facing eLearning courses.
- » has 13,400 students taking RYA online courses in 2015.
- » supports an infrastructure for around 500 sailors in 36 RYA racing squads starting from regional zone squads and working up through junior and youth coaching.
- » offers pre-course learning and knowledge checking for a range of coaching courses.

RYA Interactive has undergone a continual programme of development, with a major upgrade taking place at the time of writing this article. Constant improvements have enabled us to increase compatibility across more devices and web browsers and we will continue to explore ways to enable more centres and students to take training online if that is their preferred way of learning.

In the pipeline we have the Day Skipper shorebased course, elements of which are being developed as online modules. During 2016 the first few online modules will be available for training centres to offer as part of a blended learning programme,



meaning they will be able to structure their courses more flexibly with less time needed in the classroom.

International Certificate of Competence changes to eligibility

Reference: TN 06-14 Date: December 2014 Applies to:

- » RYA ICC test centres

The Maritime and Coastguard Agency (MCA) has authorised the RYA to issue the ICC to a wider range of applicants.

The RYA is now authorised to issue a UK ICC to the nationals of any country EXCEPT individuals

who are a national of another UNECE member state which has accepted Resolution 40 and who are also resident in another UNFCF member state which has accepted Resolution 40. unless the RYA has been given written permission to do so by the Government of the relevant

The list of UNECE member states that have accepted Resolution 40 is subject to change without notice (i.e.

whenever the government of a country adopts Resolution 40). The current list is available on the RYA website at www.rya.org.uk/ go/icc-no

Applicants are required to provide evidence of their eligibility when they first apply for an ICC and must provide evidence that they remain eligible to be issued with the ICC on renewal.

Insurance requirements for recognised training centres

Reference: TN 07-15 **Issue date:** 7 September 2015 Implementation date:

1 February 2016 with compulsory compliance by February 2017 Applies to:

- » RYA recognised training centres (RTCs)
- » Centre inspectors

Replaces: Recognition Guidance Notes section 1.2.8 to 1.2.10 plus the addition of 1.2.11

Further to Training Guidance TG 12-15 issued earlier this year, the 2016 edition of the Recognition Guidance Notes will include updated text for insurance cover as follows. New training centres applying for recognition will need to comply with these from 1 February 2016. Existing recognised training centres should comply as soon as possible but must comply by 1 February 2017.

Insurance

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The Principal is responsible for ensuring that adequate insurance covering all of its training activities is in full force and effect while the centre is recognised by the RYA. The Principal should ensure they are fully aware of the centre's legal liabilities and responsibilities arising from its RYA activities both ashore and afloat. All the centre's activities should be covered by appropriate insurance so it is

important to disclose all business and tuition/training activities to the insurer

Please note that where an RTC charters a vessel for training purposes, the Principal must ensure that adequate insurance is in place to cover RYA activities on board that vessel, including insurance for third-party liabilities.

Public liability insurance

As a minimum, the RTC must hold public liability cover of at least £3 million for its activities both afloat and ashore. In countries where this level of cover is not possible, the matter must be referred to the RYA for consideration. The purpose of public liability insurance is to indemnify the RTC and its instructors where a third party (which could be a student, customer or a member of the public) suffers personal injury or damage to their property as a result of the RTC's or instructor's negligent acts or omissions, and the RTC and/or its instructors is/ are required to defend and/or pay damages to the injured party. The RTC must therefore ensure that any instructors employed or engaged directly by the RTC are covered by the RTC's public liability insurance policy.

The RTC's public liability insurance must extend to indemnify the RTC and its

instructors where negligent advice or instruction given by the RTC or its instructors causes personal injury or other damage or loss and the RTC and/or its instructors is/ are required to defend the claim and/or pay damages.

Please note that instructors who are genuinely self-employed may be able to obtain personal insurance but an instructor's own policy is not a substitute for the RTC including the instructor on the RTC's insurance and the centre must not rely upon personal indemnity insurance to protect its interests, its instructors or its customers. The RTC must therefore ensure that any instructors employed or engaged directly by the RTC are covered by this aspect of the RTC's public liability insurance policy.

Other insurances

Centres and clubs may be required to hold other insurance such as employers liability insurance, even if you do not directly employ staff. Seek advice from your insurance broker.

It is important from the outset to ensure that:

- » You insure through a broker that understands marine insurance and that cover is arranged under a policy that takes into account your marine activities.
- » You disclose all of your

business activities to the insurer and particularly specify that tuition is provided.

If you teach children ensure you check that no restrictions are imposed by your insurance policies.

Principal's undertaking

By submitting a signed application for recognition form, a Principal confirms that they and/or the organisation they represent are fully aware of their responsibilities under any statutory or common law duty of care owed to trainees and that they have sought professional advice to assure themselves that they hold adequate insurance cover and comply with the RYA's public liability insurance requirements.

They further undertake to ensure that the activities of the establishment will at all times be covered by appropriate insurance(s). By signing the annual inspection report form they confirm their continued compliance.


Should the RTC not have adequate insurance the RYA reserves the right to suspend or withdraw recognition with immediate effect.

Using the RYA Training Plotter for teaching

o, you've downloaded the RYA Training Plotter for your next shorebased course. What next? Let's look at a timeline of an RYA Day Skipper shorebased course for some ideas on how to use this software to your advantage.

One week before Get set up

Download and install the plotter from www.rya.org.uk/go/ trainingplotter

The RYA training centre that you will be teaching for has access to the Day Skipper questions and assessments, and the Coastal Skipper/Yachtmaster™ assessments in a format you can overlay on the plotter. These are available behind the centre's login, so liaise with your centre for these and import them into the plotter.

Once you've got these overlays installed, you will be able to familiarise yourself with the questions, ready to start using the plotter in the classroom.

During the course Going through the homework

Instead of, or as well as, passing round the answer acetates to confirm students' achievements, simply select the question from the overlays and prepare for your session by individually hiding all the components on the chart. When you are going through the exercise with your students, as you describe each step simply unhide each component. You can ask your students to visually confirm it is in the right location. It doesn't matter if they have been working from the RYA Training Plotter themselves, or plotting directly on to the paper charts.

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Using the plotter as a teaching tool As a chartwork demonstration tool

The training plotter allows you to plot waypoints, dead reckonings (DRs), estimated positions (EPs), and fixes in any given position, as well as drawing bearing lines, water, ground and tidal drift lines, and finally lines with arcs.

You have the ability to change the line types and amend the position of any points you place. If you're demonstrating calculating a course to steer, for example, you can place your waypoints, draw the ground track, add the tidal vector, and then demonstrate arcing off for boat speed. The plotter software will then allow you to convert your arc line to a water track, all with the correct symbols. As a graphical representation on a projector or plasma screen, this will keep your students engaged and is an accurate method of demonstrating distances and bearings.

As a chart plotter demonstration tool

When teaching navigation to students, it is important they understand the limitations and reliability behind the tools giving them information. In the same way as you would get them to test and calibrate an echo sounder with a leadline, you can get them to investigate the certainty and source data from the RYA Training Plotter.

Right clicking on a feature and selecting 'Show Information' will enable you to bring up quality of data details, which follow the Electronic Chart Display and Information System (ECDIS) principles. This provides a useful discussion point as it is unlikely that a leisure plotter will have this



level of functionality, but just as it is important that paper charts are regularly updated, it is important that aspiring navigators are aware of the need to subjectively view information on a chart plotter screen.

Next, you could open the 'Route Monitor', by clicking on the RYA button in the top left of the Training Plotter. Load a scenario using the play icon in the top left of the screen and you can demonstrate a vessel on a passage. More importantly, the icon in the bottom right will enable you to pull up information on the quality of position, Horizontal Dilution of Position (HDOP), number of satellites in use, and time of last message received. As a demonstration tool, this is invaluable as it amplifies both the usefulness of satellite derived positions, while providing a greater depth of understanding into how reliable they are.

Setting the homework

Having demonstrated the plotter over the course of your session, it's time to get your students using it. A short demonstration of the basic functions, most of which are accessed through a simple right click, will have your students up and running in no time. All the chartwork questions in their exercise book can be completed using the RYA Training Plotter in place of a paper chart, and it's

quick and easy to review their work during the next session.

Summary

Hopefully these ideas are enough to get you started with the RYA Training Plotter. There are other techniques you can practice and resources you can prepare with the plotter, so it's a great tool to aid learning and enhance the quality of what you deliver as an instructor.

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As you may know, the Cruising Instructor and YachtmasterTM Instructor Update is now known as Revalidation as this better reflects the theme of the time on board. Vaughan Marsh gives a quick rundown of how the revalidation process works so you know what to expect next time yours is due.

The format

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revalidation course lasts two days for sailing instructors and one day for motor instructors. It is run by a Yachtmaster™ Instructor Trainer and fulfils a dual role of updating and assessing. Part of the course brings you up-to-date with any changes over the previous five years and any specific details that need to be brought to your attention. The other element checks your ability as a current instructor, including your theory knowledge, boat handling under power and sail (if you are qualified for sailing courses), teaching and debriefing skills, people skills, leadership,

situation awareness, safety, practical navigation and pilotage.

How to prepare

With four or five people per course it can be an intense period, so preparation is key. It's really important that you have actually taught some courses, polished your skills on the water and revised your theory.

Be prepared to demonstrate, watch and share. No-one enjoys being assessed but many people enjoy sharing knowledge and skills with other instructors while no real students are on board. If we acknowledge that we are different and approach things in different

ways, watching others can give us all new ideas or, indeed, confirm that our own way is still best for us. Either way, reviewing what we do as instructors is always healthy.

If you are not sure if you are ready, why not get together with other instructors to freshen up your skills. If you're concerned, feel free to pick up the phone and talk to Rachel Andrews or myself – we are more than happy to talk it through with to you.

The outcome

At the end of the revalidation the Trainer will debrief everyone individually. There are many potential outcomes, but the vast majority of instructors are revalidated for another five years. If an instructor is not up to standard, the Trainer will highlight the areas needing improvement before a reassessment.

Not reaching the required standard is often due to not having taught recently – I mentioned earlier how important it is to prepare. In general it's boat handling skills, theory knowledge or lesson structure that can let an instructor down. A general lack of familiarity often results in a candidate spending more time thinking about what they are doing rather than teaching the subject.

How often do you need to revalidate?

The normal length of a Yachtmaster™ Instructor qualification is five years. However, many people are qualified to teach both the sail and the motor cruising schemes, so to require them to revalidate both qualifications every five years is quite onerous.

To lighten the load, instructors qualified across both disciplines may alternate their revalidations between sail and motor every three years. So, one year they would revalidate their sail qualification, and three years later their motor qualification, and so on.

Booking your revalidation

To help you plan ahead we have added the dates of revalidation courses to a Google calendar on the RYA website, showing you where and when each course is run. Next year's dates are already on there, and you may also find a small number of places left during 2014. Please take a look if you are due to revalidate – see the Teaching section of Courses and Training on www.rya.org.uk.

When you have found the date you want, simply download the relevant booking form from the link in the calendar and send it to RYA Training.

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Teaching an Advanced Powerboat night exercise

he key to navigating in the dark is to have a robust plan. Most people will have a preferred method of representing their plan on paper, but often the fall back position is a table of directions which, if followed without fault, will probably result in a successful exercise. But if things go slightly awry, the navigator can quickly become disorientated and flustered.

Many learners benefit from a sketch of the operating area – a fairly simple diagram onto which they transpose their plan. The sketch should include all relevant information with notes written in a dark pen, large enough to read in poor lighting whilst afloat. This method allows a navigator

to orientate the plan and know in broad terms which way they should be looking to find their next waypoint, rather than having to work it out arithmetically.

For lots of us, the stress of having to do maths when we're cold, wet and maybe a little bit lost can be too daunting. It doesn't take much for the able student to start doubting themselves. Once this happens, it can spiral out of control as they struggle to remember the basics such as returning to a known point, rather than ploughing on into the unknown.

As instructors we can really help our students by giving them a range of methods to use. They are likely to be aware of the use of speed/time/distance, as this is

taught early in their navigating. This is a useful method but, on its own, it is fairly weak. However, the use of a transit or a back bearing, as well as a cross bearing can really ramp up accuracy. Add in expected depth and as these parts of the puzzle start to line up, the students' confidence grows.

Navigating to unlit positions is a great way of reinforcing the use of a number of methods as the student will not accidentally stumble on the position as they could an unlit object. It is important that the instructor considers the position they set, as there should be a navigational reason to go there, for example a transit plus a depth. Don't just rely on the coordinates straight from

the GPS as your check.

The beauty of an unlit position is that, if the night exercise is less successful than anticipated, the student can revise their plan and rerun it in daylight.

Remember that in order to teach Advanced Powerboat, an Advanced Powerboat Instructor must hold a valid Advanced Powerboat Certificate with a commercial endorsement as well as the Advanced Powerboat Instructor endorsement.

elming or skippering a powerboat responsibly and safely has always been a top priority within the RYA Powerboat Scheme. As we know, it is a requirement of recognition that all safety boat drivers and anyone helming during a powerboat course must wear the kill cord, unless driving a heavy displacement vessel. If we as instructors don't lead by example, reminding students every time they forget that they must wear the killcord and, for that matter, keep one hand on the wheel and one hand on the throttle, they stand little chance of remembering in the future without our prompt.

Making killcords second nature should be at the forefront of our collective mind. Despite a sustained campaign and the new "Think! Wear your killcord stickers", there are still plenty of people not using their killcord almost everywhere we look. Although it is heartening to note that many marinas, harbour masters' offices and slipways are now displaying signage to remind boaters about this vital piece of safety equipment, our best way is to lead by example during all our training sessions.

Nowadays, instructors should be discussing more powerful engines, and what happens if the hull loses

grip on the water, slips sideways and then flips back upright, throwing people from the boat. There is a guide to this in Wavelength April 2014 - 'Control in a high speed turn'.

There were over 1000 respondents to the killcord/ kill switch survey - thanks to all who took part. The results will be discussed at the RYA Training conference and in a subsequent Wavelength article.

Although the safety messages are clear within RYA recognised training centres, we are always open to suggestions about how to connect with the wider boating public on essential safety advice.



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AEDs: are they for you?

An Automated External Defibrilator (AED) is a portable, computerised, battery operated device that checks the heart rhythm and delivers a potentially lifesaving shock, if it is required. They will not deliver a shock when it is not necessary, even if the button is pressed. Voice prompts direct the operator through each step, making them safe and easy to use. They form the third link in the chain of survival from the recognition of cardiac arrest, through CPR to advanced care.

Following the 2011 syllabus update, an awareness of AEDs became part of the RYA First Aid Course. Some clubs and marinas have bought them, they are commonly seen at airports, railway stations and on TV, but are they for you?

When and why are AEDs needed?

he heart pumps blood to the lungs to pick up oxygen and circulate it round the body. To do this, the heart muscle requires a good blood supply itself, provided by the coronary arteries. If these arteries have become narrowed there may be insufficient blood flow, which causes the pain of angina. Typically angina occurs during exercise or exertion when the heart is working harder and therefore requires more oxygen rich blood. It should ease with rest. Glycerol Trinitrite (GTN) is available in the Category C Medical Stores if

In a heart attack a coronary artery becomes blocked, an area of heart muscle is deprived of oxygen, and dies, and the pain persists. The damaged heart muscle may not be able to create the co-ordinated electrical impulses necessary and sudden cardiac death may occur. Initially the heartbeat may become dangerously fast, as in VT, (ventricular tachycardia) or more commonly, chaotic, as in VF (ventricular fibrillation). The chaotic, often irregular heart rhythm of VF means that the heart stops pumping blood effectively, rapidly starving the brain and other vital organs of blood and oxygen. If the patient survives they may have permanent damage to the heart, brain and other organs.

An AED is designed to reverse VF and allow an effective heart rhythm to be re-established, but the chance of success decreases rapidly. Every second counts.

Of course CPR is a vital step in

the lifesaving process, and can keep some blood circulating. It must be started immediately, maintained until the AED arrives and quickly resumed between shocks.

How to use an AED

When the AED is opened the voice prompts begin immediately. Some machines require switching on and the pads to be plugged in, while others are ready to go. Once the pads are in place, the AED automatically analyses the

heart rhythm and determines if a shock is needed. If it is, the machine instructs the user to push a flashing button to deliver the shock, and then continue CPR if necessary. The process can be repeated as needed until the emergency crew takes over.

The case of the footballer who survived to be fit and well after over an hour of CPR and shocks should encourage all rescuers to continue resuscitation for as long as possible.

Who can use an AED?

An AED can be used safely and effectively without training, and their use should not be restricted to trained personnel only. However practical training is recommended when there is an AED on site. Many short courses are on offer and video demonstrations can be found on the British Heart Foundation's DVD 'Skills for Life' and on the DVD included in the Resuscitation Council book 'CPR and AED', among many others.

Do you need one?

The presence of an AED at a club or centre where there may be hundreds of people on site, where staff or members can be trained and when an ambulance can arrive quickly, makes a lot of sense. But afloat you must take into account some practical considerations:

- » Will the AED be usable in your craft? Consider the lack of space, the possibility of excessive movement, and the presence of water and fumes.
- » Will its use delay transport ashore where an ambulance could be waiting?
- » If the boat is offshore, successful defibrillation will not ensure the patient's survival, as advanced cardiac care may not be available for many hours.
- » The relatively low number of people on most boats makes the probability of it use low, in contrast to more highly populated areas.
- » Like most safety equipment, the cost of AEDs is relatively high, so priorities will have to be made.

AED procedure

- 1. Check for dangers to self, bystanders and casualty.
- 2. Check for response. If unresponsive shout for help.
- 3. Open the airway. If not breathing normally send for assistance and an AED.
- 4. Start CPR, and maintain until AED arrives.
- 5. Switch on the AED immediately and attach pads to the patient's bare chest without delay. Place and stick the pads with care:

Place one below the right collar bone and the other 10cm below the left armpit in a vertical axis. Many pads are labelled left and right but reversal does not matter.

Dry the chest to ensure the pads stick firmly and dry across the chest between the pads if necessary.

Shave small areas of the chest if required so the pads will stick. **Avoid** placing the pads over jewellery or an implanted pacemaker or defibrillator.

Remove any medicinal patches.

- 6. Follow the voice prompts. The AED will assess the heart rhythm. Do not touch the patient or allow movement.
- 7. If a shock is advised, do not touch the patient as the shock is delivered. Avoid kneeling in water or on a metal surface if possible.
- 8. Consider the presence of fumes. Do not use if petrol fumes are present.
- 9. Resume CPR immediately, and continue for two minutes when the AED will analyse again.

Continue CPR and shocks until the casualty shows signs of regaining consciousness such as coughing, opening their eyes or moving purposefully AND breathing normally, until someone else takes over or you are too exhausted to continue.



Following the 2015 event, clubs were able to benefit from almost 1,500 family memberships and more than 2,000 individual memberships. Activity centres who participated in the nine-day event also reported that over 3,000 individuals signed up for follow on activities including

additional taster sessions or start sailing courses.

With Rio 2016 taking place from 5-21 August, there is also the opportunity to capitalise on the increased interest this event will generate by hosting late-season open days and events. Clubs and centres could benefit greatly from starting to look at opportunities to use the interest generated from the Olympics, whether these are extra taster sessions, open days or even showing the Olympic racing on a screen in your club or centre. We are aware that the sailing will be held from 1700 until 2030 UK time each day, meaning it is the perfect opportunity to generate greater interest not only in the sport, but also specifically your club.

From the 7-18 September, the Paralympic Games will provide

a similar spike in interest and engagement from the public. This can also provide Sailability sites, currently numbering more than 200, the chance to host their own specially tailored events and captivate a brand new audience.

Duncan Truswell, RYA Sport Development Manager, said: "With so much happening for sailing in 2016, we hope that sailing providers will benefit from greater interest and coverage of the sport.

Events such as the Olympics and America's Cup World Series Portsmouth give clubs and training centres a fantastic opportunity to encourage a new generation to take to the water. Ensuring you are prepared for the year ahead is vital, so taking time now to plan in advance will prove worthwhile."



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
