- You may use descriptions such as “consecutive” “again” “three years running” which acknowledge previous evaluations.

“consecutive”

“ABC Company has been named a leader for three consecutive years.”

“This was the third consecutive year for ABC Company to be recognized as a leader in this report.”

“again”

“We did it again! Gartner named us a Magic Quadrant leader.”

“A Gartner Leader...Again!”

**“in a row”
“running”
“back to back”**

“Gartner named us a leader for three years in a row.”

“For three years running we’ve been recognized by Gartner as a leader in the Magic Quadrant for XYZ.”

“Recognized a LEADER by Gartner three years back-to-back in ABC Magic Quadrant.”

- You may use words such as “furthest” and “highest” when comparing your placement on the “x” and “y” axes.
