Nigeria Faso Coverage Report – SMC Cycle 3 2017

Preimilary report





Figure 1: Cycle 3 coverage survey districts, Nigeria

Notes: Survey took place between 11th October and 15thth October 2017, across 66 villages in Zamfara, Sokoto, Jigawa and Katsina (Figure 1). A total of 1,749 households were visited and 99.1% (1734/1749) agreed to participate in the survey, the reasons for non-response (15/1,749) were; the inability to find someone to speak with (n=7); no children aged between 3 months and 7 years (n=5) and interviewers unable to access compound (n=1).

Overall coverage was 60.6%. Coverage by state (Table 5). The most common reason given for not receiving SMC was because the health worker did not visit the household (Table 2). Coverage of SMC amongst older children (6 or more years old) and was 42% (Table 6).


