

# Revenues and Expenditures for Public Elementary and Secondary Education: FY 19

This set of tables introduces new data for national and state-level public elementary and secondary revenues and expenditures for fiscal year (FY) 2019. Specifically, this report includes the following school finance data

- revenue and expenditure totals;
- revenues by source;
- expenditures by function and object;
- current expenditures;1 and
- current expenditures per pupil.

The expenditure functions include instruction, instructional staff support services, pupil support services, general administration, school administration, operations and maintenance, student transportation, other support services (such as business services), food services, enterprise operations, and total current expenditures. Objects reported within a function include salaries, employee benefits, purchased services, supplies, and equipment.

The finance data used in this report are from the National Public Education Financial Survey (NPEFS), a component of the Common Core of Data (CCD). The CCD is the primary National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) database on public elementary and secondary education in the United States.

State education agencies (SEAs) in each of the 50 states; the District of Columbia; and the 5 other jurisdictions of American Samoa, Guam, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands report these data annually to NCES. While the tables in this report include data for all NPEFS respondents, the figures and selected findings are limited to the 50 states and the District of Columbia.

The tables in this report present descriptive information on the revenues and expenditures for FY 19. The tables and figures chosen for this report demonstrate the range of information available when using NPEFS. They do not represent all of the data and are not meant to emphasize any particular issue.

Whenever comparisons were made between FY 18 and FY 19 data, the FY 18 data were obtained from the NPEFS FY 18 final (version 2a) data file. Updated tables for FY 18 can be found online at <a href="https://nces.ed.gov/ccd/data\_tables.asp">https://nces.ed.gov/ccd/data\_tables.asp</a>.

## **DATA**

The tables present data from the FY 19 NPEFS provisional (version 1a) data file and the FY 18 NPEFS final (version 2a) data file. The membership data used in this report come from the State Nonfiscal Survey, school year 2018-19 version 1a and 2017-18 version 1a.

SEAs report data for CCD surveys annually to NCES. The U.S. Census Bureau conducts the data collection for the finance surveys on behalf of NCES. NCES collects data for all three CCD nonfiscal universe surveys through the EDFacts submission system. SEAs participate in CCD voluntarily, following standard definitions for the data items they report.

The NPEFS instructions ask SEAs to report revenues and expenditures covering prekindergarten through high school public education in regular, special, and vocational schools; charter schools; and state-run education programs (such as special education schools or education programs for incarcerated youth).



The 50 states and the District of Columbia reported \$764.7 billion in revenues collected for public elementary and secondary education in FY 19 (table 1). State and local governments provided \$704.4 billion, or 92.1 percent of all revenues. The federal government contributed \$60.3 billion, or 7.9 percent of all revenues (derived from table 1). Total revenues increased by 2.0 percent (from \$749.9 to \$764.7 billion) from FY 18 to FY 19, local revenues increased by 2.2 percent (from \$339.9 to \$347.4 billion), state revenues increased by 1.6 percent (from \$351.5 to \$357.0 billion), and federal revenues increased by 3.1 percent (from \$58.5 to \$60.3 billion) (tables 1 and 9, after adjusting for inflation)<sup>2</sup> (figure 1).

Total revenues per pupil averaged \$15,122 on a national basis in FY 19 (table 2). This is an increase of 2.0 percent between FY 18 and FY 19, and follows an increase of 1.8 percent from FY 17 to FY 18 (table 2, after adjusting for inflation). The percentage change in revenues per pupil from FY 18 to FY 19 ranged from 10.2 percent in Washington to -17.2 percent in Illinois. Total revenues per pupil increased in 40 states between FY 18 and FY 19. Total revenues per pupil decreased in 10 states and the District of Columbia between FY 18 and FY 19.

Figure 1. Source of revenues for public elementary and secondary education for the United States (in billions of dollars): FY 18 and FY 19



NOTE: These data are not adjusted for geographic cost differences. Current expenditures include instruction, instruction-related, support services, and other elementary/secondary current expenditures, but exclude expenditures on capital outlay, other programs, and interest on long-term debt. Per pupil expenditures are calculated using student membership. The student membership variable is derived from the State Nonfiscal Survey of Public Elementary/Secondary Education. In FY 19, Arizona, New York, and Oregon indicated that the state fiscal data reported in NPEFS did not include finance data for prekindergarten programs. In these states, the NPEFS total student membership variable excludes prekindergarten membership. California did not report prekindergarten membership in the State Nonfiscal Survey of Public Elementary/Secondary Education. For California, the data in the Nonfiscal public release file have been imputed and only include preschool students with disabilities, as reported for the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). The number of students enrolled in preschool in California is likely much higher. California reported prekindergarten expenditures separately, and these expenditures were excluded from the amounts reported in this figure. This figure only includes expenditures for K-12 and special education preschool programs in California. Illinois and New Hampshire indicated that the state fiscal data reported in NPEFS did not include independent charter school districts, and students in those independent charter school districts are excluded from the NPEFS total student membership.

Current expenditures for public elementary and secondary education across the nation increased by 2.1 percent between FY 18 and FY 19 (from \$653.0 to \$666.9 billion, tables 3 and 9, after adjusting for inflation), after increasing 1.0 percent between FY 17 and FY 18.

Within that increase, expenditures for instruction also increased by 1.8 percent between FY 18 and FY 19 (from \$396.0 to \$403.0 billion);

and student support expenditures increased by 5.5 percent in FY 19 compared to FY 18 (from \$38.8 to \$40.9 billion) (table 9, after adjusting for inflation).

Current expenditures per pupil<sup>3</sup> on a national basis increased by 2.1 percent to \$13,187 from FY 18 to FY 19, following an increase of 0.9 percent between FY 17 and FY 18 (tables 4, 5, and 9, after adjusting for inflation). Current expenditures per pupil ranged


from \$7,950 in Utah to \$24,882 in New York. In addition to New York, current expenditures per pupil were among the five highest in the District of Columbia (\$22,831), New Jersey (\$21,331), Vermont (\$21,217), and Connecticut (\$21,140) (table 4 and figure 2). In addition to Utah, current expenditures per pupil were among the five lowest in Idaho (\$8,043), Arizona (\$8,773), Nevada (\$9,126), and Oklahoma (\$9,203).

Increases in current expenditures per pupil from FY 18 to FY 19 were among the five highest in Oklahoma (10.3 percent), Washington (8.2 percent), Colorado (5.9 percent), California (5.5 percent), and West Virginia (3.9 percent). Decreases in current expenditures per pupil between FY 18 and FY 19 were among the five largest in the District of Columbia (-3.4 percent), Nebraska (-2.5 percent), Wyoming (-1.5 percent), South Dakota (-1.4 percent), and Nevada (-1.1 percent) (table 5, after adjusting for inflation).

In FY 19, salaries and wages (\$368.9 billion) in conjunction with employee benefits (\$161.4 billion) accounted for 79.5 percent (\$530.2 billion) of current expenditures for public elementary and secondary education (derived from table 6 and **figure 3**). Expenditures for instruction and instructional staff support services comprised 65.3 percent (\$435.2 billion) of total current expenditures (derived from table 6).<sup>4</sup>

Total expenditures increased by 2.6 percent (from \$749.8 to \$769.0 billion) between FY 18 and FY 19 (tables 7 and 9, after adjusting for inflation). Of the \$769.0 billion in total expenditures, 86.7 percent are current expenditures, 9.5 percent are capital outlay expenditures, 2.7 percent are interest on debt, and 1.1 percent are expenditures for other programs (derived from table 7 and figure 4).

Figure 3. Salaries and wages, employee benefits, and other expenditures, by function for the United States (in billions of dollars): FY 19



Current expenditures from federal Title I grants for economically disadvantaged students<sup>5</sup> (including carryover expenditures) accounted for \$15.2 billion, or 2.3 percent of current expenditures for public elementary and secondary education at the national level in FY 19 (derived from table 8). Title I expenditures per pupil averaged \$300 on a national level and ranged from \$122 in Utah to \$498 in the District of Columbia.<sup>6</sup>

#### **ENDNOTES**

<sup>1</sup>Researchers generally use current expenditures instead of total expenditures when comparing education spending between states or across time. Current expenditures exclude expenditures for capital outlay, which tend to have dramatic increases and decreases from year to year. Current expenditures are for public elementary and secondary education only. Many school districts also support community services, adult education, private education, and other programs, which are included in total expenditures. These programs and the extent to which they are funded by school districts vary greatly, both across and within states.

<sup>2</sup> Whenever comparisons were made between FY 18 and FY 19 data, the FY 18 data were adjusted to FY 19 dollars. Inflation adjustments utilize the Consumer Price Index (CPI) published by the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics. This price index measures the average change in inflation of a fixed market basket of goods and services purchased by consumers. For comparability to fiscal education data, NCES adjusts the CPI from a calendar year to a school fiscal year basis (July through June). See Digest of Education Statistics 2019, Table 106.70. Retrieved January 8, 2021, from <a href="https://nces.ed.gov/">https://nces.ed.gov/</a> programs/digest/d19/tables/ dt19 106.70.asp. The FY 18 amount adjusted to FY 19 dollars is equal to the FY 18 amount multiplied by the 2018-19 CPI (253.268) and then divided by the 2017-18 CPI (248.126).

<sup>3</sup> The student membership variable is derived from the State Nonfiscal Survey of Public Elementary/
Secondary Education. The FY 19
NPEFS data file includes total student membership reported on the school year 2018-19 State Nonfiscal Survey that includes grades prekindergarten through grade 12 (plus ungraded). If the reported fiscal data exclude prekindergarten programs, total membership on the NPEFS data file also excludes prekindergarten membership. As part of the FY 19

NPEFS collection process, NCES asked SEAs to review student membership data from the State Nonfiscal Survey and verify that the membership data are consistent with the programs covered in the revenues and expenditures data reported in NPEFS. Arizona, New York, and Oregon indicated that the state fiscal data reported in NPEFS did not include finance data for prekindergarten programs. In these states, the NPEFS total student membership variable excludes prekindergarten membership. California did not report prekindergarten membership in the State Nonfiscal Survey of Public Elementary/Secondary Education. For California, the data in the nonfiscal public release file have been imputed and only include preschool students with disabilities, as reported for the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). The number of students enrolled in preschool in California is likely much higher. For FY 19, California reported prekindergarten expenditures separately, and these expenditures were excluded from the amounts in this report. This report only includes expenditures for K-12 and special education preschool programs in California. In FY 17 and FY 18, fiscal data for all of California's prekindergarten programs are included. Illinois and New Hampshire indicated that the state fiscal data reported in NPEFS did not include independent charter school districts, and students in those independent charter school districts are excluded from the NPEFS total student membership.

<sup>4</sup> Expenditures for instruction and instructional staff support services include expenditures that are directly related to providing instruction and for activities that assist with classroom instruction. The instruction and

instruction-related expenditures category is more expansive than only instruction expenditures. Specifically, the instruction and instruction-related expenditures category includes salaries and benefits for teachers, teaching assistants, librarians and library aides, in-service teacher trainers, curriculum development, student assessment, technology (for students, but outside the classroom), and supplies and purchased services related to those activities.

<sup>5</sup> FY 2018 Department of Education funds are available for spending by school districts beginning with the 2018-19 school year. Title I grants data are from Digest of Education Statistics 2019. Retrieved January 8, 2021, from https://nces.ed.gov/programs/digest/ d19/tables/dt19 401.60.asp. The report presents the calculated allocation amounts as published by the Department of Education for the following formula grant programs: Grants to Local Education Agencies (Basic, Concentration, Targeted, and Education Finance Incentive Grants), School Turnaround, Migrant Education, and Neglected and Delinquent Children. Allocations were made in FY 18 and became available for use in the 2018-19 school year. Actual amounts received by local education agencies (LEAs) may be smaller than those presented due to state-level adjustments to federal Title I allocations and permitted state reservations for administration and school improvement activities.

<sup>6</sup> Title I expenditures are reported by states on NPEFS as either current year or carryover expenditures. A provision in the Title I statute allows LEAs to carry over a portion of the funds allocated to be spent in future fiscal years; however, some states did not separate carryover expenditures

from current year expenditures in their NPEFS reporting. As a result, current year expenditures may exceed the total allocation amount for a particular state.

LEAs may also receive Title I funding through competitive grant programs. Title I expenditures reported on NPEFS include all expenditures for Title I programs, including both formula and competitive grants. While these programs account for a small proportion of total Title I funds, the inclusion of these programs may cause expenditures to exceed the total allocation amount for a particular state.

The law does not stipulate how Title I funds are to be spent. Many Title I funds are used to support schoolwide programs, such as extended-day kindergarten programs; learning laboratories in mathematics, science, and computers; special afterschool and summer programs to extend and reinforce the regular school curriculum; and other services to extend and accelerate academic progress. Thus, Title I expenditures per pupil are calculated by dividing the total of current year and carryover expenditures by membership, which includes both Title I eligible students and noneligible students.
