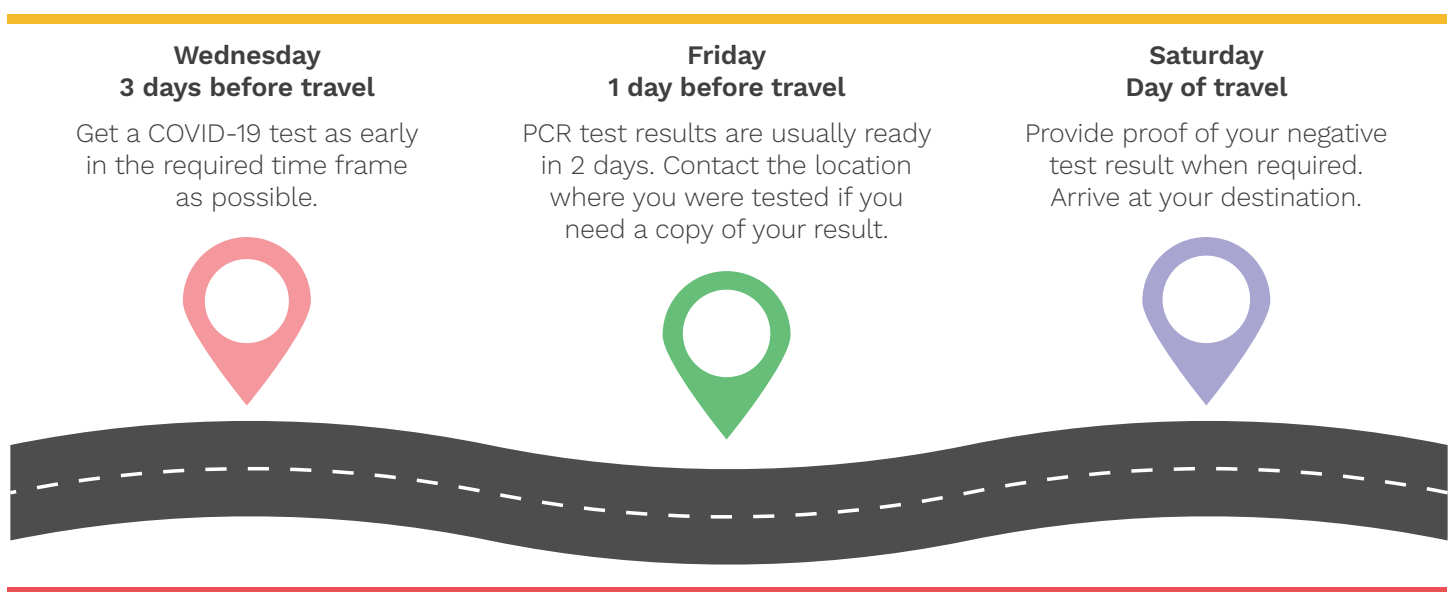


Traveling out of state?

Don't forget your COVID-19 test.

Ask the health department in the state or country you are traveling to for quarantine guidance and testing requirements. Some states, countries, or airlines require proof of a negative result from a test taken within 72 hours prior to arrival. Make sure you have enough time to get your test result before you travel.

In the below example, a Rhode Islander is planning to arrive at their travel destination on a Saturday. The location they are traveling to requires proof of a negative result from a lab-processed PCR test taken within the 3 days before arrival.



Rhode Island's State-run test sites are intended for diagnostic testing and asymptomatic screening only. Results from State-run test sites are not guaranteed to meet testing requirements for travel. If you are getting tested before or after travel because you need test results within a strict timeframe or documentation more detailed than a standard lab report, you may need to be tested elsewhere. Traveling to Rhode Island?

You are not currently required to get tested or quarantine after arrival in Rhode Island. To lower the chances of catching and spreading COVID-19, the Rhode Island Department of Health (RIDOH) recommends travelers get tested 3-5 days after arrival. For more information, visit covid.ri.gov/travel.

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
