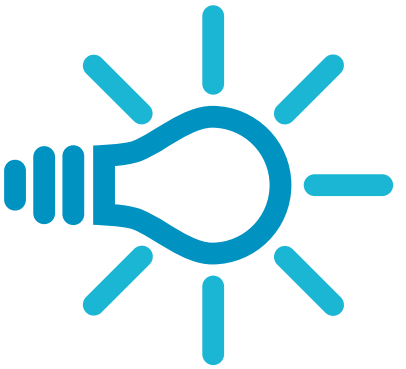


Modernise your IT

Competition

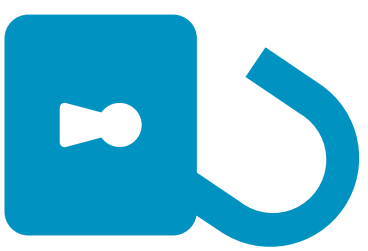
Free Software prevents monopolies and enhances competition.

Autonomy

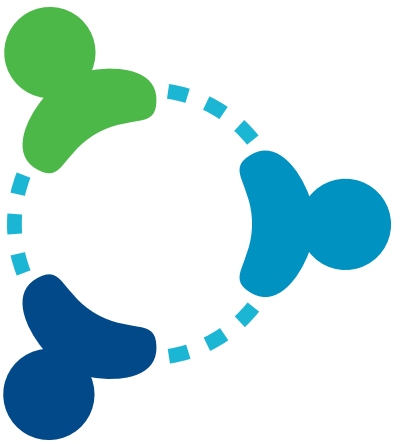
Free Software helps to develop and maintain tailored software that suits your needs, not just the vendor's business model.

Collaboration

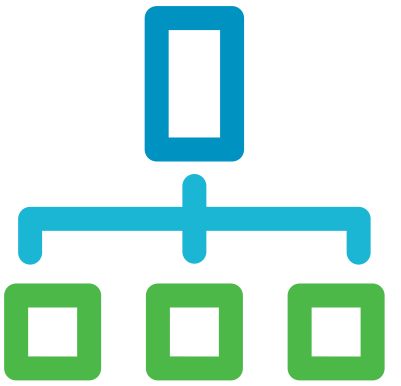
Free Software can be shared and used in a non-exclusive way by everyone – serving the public good.

Hidden Champion

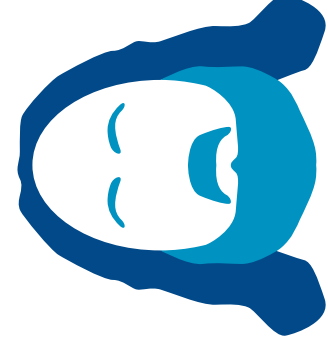
The infrastructures of the biggest IT companies are based on Free Software.

First Free Software Licence

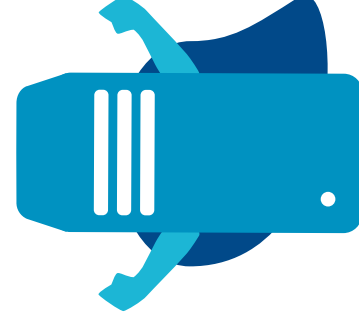
The first Free Software licence was developed in 1985 by Richard Stallman, long before the World Wide Web existed.

Linux

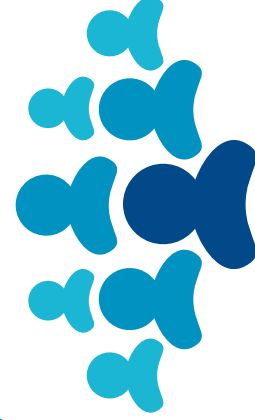
In 1991, Linus Torvalds released his first code lines for an operating system kernel under a Free Software licence – Linux was born.

Supercomputers

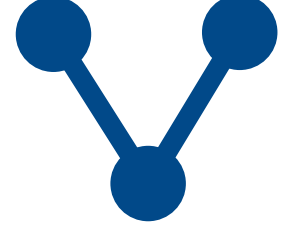
The world's top 500 supercomputers all run Linux.

Collaboration

With more than 15,000 developers having contributed code, Linux is the largest collaborative development project in computing history.

Sharing is Caring

The most popular Free Software version control system used for collaboration is Git. Its biggest hosting service GitHub has over 28 million public repositories.

Public Good

UNESCO acknowledges benefits of Free Software as a practical instrument for development efforts and uses Free Software for various projects.

Public Code

GitHub hosts over 700 government organisations with more than 9,000 public repositories. EU member state Estonia has the most per capita and its Free Software is reused globally.
